Down Jersey Dxing

It's the end of another year! But DXing doesn't know that it is.... For me, we are getting into the better part of the year for the low bands. Propagation, especially on 80M and 160M, can really peak during the cold months. It is amazing how quiet the low bands can be as we prepare for snow, ice, and another Eagle's loss! Take a listen just before bed at night or early morning before work, and you may be surprised by what you hear and how much easier it may be to hear it! I can still remember being stunned one morning before going to high school listening on 40M in the winter and hearing an Hawaiian station "booming" in. I worked it for my first ever KH6 contact! Not bad for 50 watts, an unstable Heathkit VFO, and a low dipole that my mother thought about using for a clothesline!

This particular season is also a good time to take stock of what you did for the year as far as operating is concerned. I take a look at how well my antennas/rigs did for the year. There is little argument that, with John Fisher's recent passing, GCARC has lost its most complete ham to the SK rolls. John was probably involved in and interested in more facets of the hobby than any member of our Club. John did not join GCARC until the middle nineteen seventies long after acquiring his first license in 1938. But in a few short years, his accomplishments within the Club were legend. He served the club as Director, President (1988), and was Corresponding Secretary for some 10 years. He was Hamfest Chairman, Field Day Chairman, and, for some 20 years, was a FD band chairman for 20, 40, 80, or 6 meters. He headed up GCARC's support of the Pitman Crop Walks and spearheaded the Clubs participation in the Cancer Bike-A-Thons for many years. He was a prolific writer authoring many technical, DX, and other articles for Crosstalk and was involved in the circulation of Crosstalk for several years. He served the Club as TVI and Technical Committee Chairman and was the Technical Chairman for the ARRL SNJ Section for some 20 years. He was a DXCC card checker and a VEC for the League. By virtue of his technical expertise (RCA engineer), he presented many technical talks for our Club's programs. John was an avid Dixer and Contester. He had 342 countries confirmed and was on both the Mixed and CW Honor rolls. John needed only N. Korea to attain the position of Top of the Honor Roll. John participated in 3 Dxpeditions to the Galapagos Islands (HC8). He held virtually all other DX achievements including the coveted 5BWAZ award. John was also a member of the Frankford Radio Club, the former Southern NJ DX Club, and was a Life member of the League. His versatility extended to VHF/UHF as he was very active in the RACES and AREC nets and related activities. GCARC honored John in 1982 by presenting him with the Milt Goldman Award. John was the first club member, following the initial presentation to Milt, K3WIN, in 1981, to receive this honor. Unquestionably, GCARC has lost a "Pillar" of our Club and a good friend to its members. The Club extends its condolences and sympathies to his two sons and to his family.

ARES/RACES Happenings

For 2008 I'll be chairing that ARES/RACES Committee. Thanks to Dave MacDonald, WB3JOY, for his service to the club as the previous committee chair. Doug Gehring, WA2NPD, asked me to write a monthly update for [Crosstalk](#); my goal is to provide timely and concise news to the membership in the emergency communications segment of ham radio.

The biggest news in Southern New Jersey emergency communication (EMCOMM) begins with the initials MCC (Medical Coordination Center). Funded by the NJ Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS), there are 2 MCC facilities in the section, Cooper University Hospital in Camden and Atlanti-Care Regional Medical Center in Atlantic City. The mission of the MCC is planning, coordination and management of medical and medically related activities. The MCC allows “one stop shopping” for hospitals to request assistance from DHSS and allow information and resources to flow between hospitals and County Emergency Operations Centers. Last month I attended a meeting at the Cooper University Hospital MCC with personnel from Cumberland and Camden County’s RACES organizations and the atmosphere was exciting. DHSS has embraced ham radio in a big way and has plans in place to utilize ARES and RACES for many EMCOMM needs. The administrations of all NJ hospitals initially requested ham radio support and the MCC will help the County organizations establish relationships and maintain liaisons. This is a huge service opportunity for ham radio and we’ll need more operators to help out.

In the January 2008 issue of QST magazine there is a great article on free online Incident Command System training provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. A computer with a web browser is all that is required to take the classes. The classes are short and easily digestible, about 2 to 3 hours apiece. The ARRL recommends ICS100, 200, 700, and 800 for ARES members, as does Gloucester County for RACES. Also recommended is the Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Course (ARECC) Level I. While it isn’t free, it is an excellent investment that leaves no doubt about your qualifications. ARECC Level I and II can (and have been) be taught locally if online courses don’t meet your needs.

Every ham with a desire to be involved in EMCOMM needs to take advantage this training and improve their skills. The agencies we serve have built their response structures based on the Incident Command System, and if ham radio wants to play a part there needs to be integration with those served agencies. If we’re not ready and qualified to respond, we won’t get called.

Possible Change in General Membership Meeting Start Time

The General Membership Meeting has started at 8PM for a number of years and we have to vacate our current meeting room by 9:30PM which gives us very little time for a business meeting and a program. At a future meeting the board would like to hear discussion from the members about changing the meeting starting time to 7:30PM or earlier.
