Check your April pages of QST for an article about some positive regulatory changes on 40 Meter Band. After decades of broadcasting in the middle of 40 Meter band, commercial stations that have been the cause of tremendous QRM on the band are moving. Using "split" operation on 40 Meter Phone for DX here in the USA has been difficult, to put it mildly, for many years. These detailed changes will make for much easier DXing on "ole reliable" 40!

As this column is being written, winter will be easing into spring this weekend. Be aware of seasonal HF signal enhancement on the HF bands with this event. The condition occurs despite solar cycles. Look for some short but hopefully sweet openings on the higher bands through 10 Meters in the next few weeks!

There seems to have been quite a flurry of DX activity in March as compared to the April. Contest scheduling might have had something to do with it. At any rate, DX "pickings" are not as substantial as last month. But, there appears to be improved IOTA activity starting up again, for you island hunters. Possibly the Europeans are coming out of winter hibernation to offer us some new and different islands to enhance our totals. Bear in mind that our continental friends are afforded many more work days off normally in the calendar year than we have in the states! Watch the DX clusters for activity and island designations.

Novice Bands Are Alive and Well

A long time ago in a hobby far, far away, the means that most folks entered ham radio was through the Novice license. Originally with just an allocation on 80 meters, it was a low-impact way to discover what it was all about, build some gear, keep mistakes to a minimum, make some contacts, meet new friends and be mentored into the community.

That has changed, of course and there are relatively few Novices who still hold that license. Most still involved have upgraded as was originally intended. There is still a section of the 40 meters, once termed the “Novice Band”, where life slows down a bit and learning/improving your CW skills are very much encouraged.

From 7100 to 7125 KHz, you can still find many slow speed QSOs. More than a few are done with straight keys, helping all to improve their "fists" and work off some nervousness. You'll find a mix of operators all the way up to Extras - either recent entries learning the code for fun to Old Timers Elmering others. The Straight Key Century Club (SKCC) had designated 7114 KHz to be something of a "watering hole", while others can be found near 7110, 7116, 7122 or just about anywhere in between. In the evening, you'll have to squeeze your way in between European broadcasters, but the propaganda remnants of Il Duce and Mrs. Schickelgruber's son will disappear at the end of March to other places in the spectrum to finally free up the band just for us.

Many are using crystal controlled homebrew rigs, and a random sample indicates that many are running 20 watts or less. So give it a try sometime. QRP/QRS - low and slow.

A Sign of the Times

On March 16, Jim Smith, W0MJY, owner of Burghardt Amateur Center in Watertown, South announced that the company will no longer sell Amateur Radio transceivers and accessories. The company will now be called Burghardt Radio Repair and the company has canceled all backorders of amateur radio equipment.

Smith blamed the current economic conditions for the change that forced the company "to re-evaluate our goals and direction." He said further, "We will continue to provide radio repair service as it has become a very busy business." The company had been forced to lay off employees in the past couple of months.

We will probably see more of the above until the economy straightens out. The bright side of this is that as things tighten up maybe more amateurs will return to the basics of amateur radio with less appliance operation and more understanding of how the equipment works. Who knows home brewing may even become more prevalent again.
