INTERVIEW WITH A HAM

This article is the thirty-fourth in a series to appear in Crosstalk, the last one appearing in the July, 1975 issue. There have been three different authors over the years.

The subject of our interview this month is Charlie Sketchley,

Charlie was born in Philadelphia on July
14, 1919, and attended public schools in the city, graduating from
Northeast High School in 1939.

During World War II, Charlie was a radio operator with the 1st Army Headquarters in Europe.

After his discharge from the Army in 1945, Charlie started working for the Exide Storage Battery Company. In 1948, he and Ruth Hartzell were married and, two years later, moved to their present home in Woodbury.

Charlie became a General class Amateur Radio operator in 1955, with the same call he now holds. In 1968 he upgraded to Amateur Extra.

Charlie has a small but well-equipped ham shack, and has capabilities for all bands from 160 meters through 440 MHz. His pride and joy is a Kenwood TS-940 AT with a TL-922 and Nye antenna tuner for the HF bands. For the VHF/UHF bands he has an Icom 3200A for 2M & 440, an Icom 37A for 220, a Yaesu FT-625RD, Yaesu 225RD, plus among other accessories a Kenwood SM-220 Scope and pan adaptor, a TRS-80 Model 4, a Macrotronics T3 terminal, and a Kantronics KPC-2.

Charlie's antenna system is ample also with a TA-36 beam on a 50 foot tower, plus a 19 element 2 meter Boomer, 80 and 40 M. trap dipole and verticals for 220 and 440 MHz.

Charlie is an experimenter, builder, and knowledgeable troubleshooter/repairman. He even finds time to get on the air once in a while since retiring a couple of years ago. He is a life member of both GCARC and ARRL. He holds WAS and WAC and has been active in ARES

and RACES for many years.

For several years, Charlie was a member of the Board of Directors, and is a past Vice President of the club. He has served on many committees, among them Membership, Projects, Data Processing, Help and Welfare, Club Historian, and at one time served as Emergency Coordinator.

VHF Ham Radio is Being Threatened!

ON FEBRUARY 12, THE FCC RELEASED A NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULE MAKING, GENERAL DOCKET 87-14, THAT PROPOSES TO ALLOCATE 220 TO 222 MHZ ON AN EXCLUSIVE BASIS TO THE LAND MOBILE SERVICE AND 222 TO 225 MHZ EXCLUSIVELY TO THE AMATEUR SERVICE. ACCORDING TO THE FCC, THE 220 TO 225 MHZ BAND IS UNDERUTILIZED, AND THE LAND MOBILE SERVICE HAS NEEDS THAT CAN BE MET IN THIS REGION OF THE SPECTRUM. COMMENTS ON THIS PROPOSAL MAY BE FILED WITH THE FCC ON OR BEFORE APRIL 6, 1987.

The effect of this NPRM would be felt not only on 220, but also on 10, 6, 2, and 0.7 meters. The part of the band that we would lose contains control and link channels for a large number of existing repeaters on other bands, probably including repeaters that you use. It is worth noting that the outstanding work done by Hams at the Chase train wreck was made possible in part by repeaters with 220 MHz links. 440 is rapidly filling up, so there is no place for these links and control channels to go, unless some of the 220 repeater channels are eliminated. Packet use is doubling every 5 months, and high speed intercity links are now in use, with many more being being built on 220.55,.65,.75,.85, and .95. No other band is satisfactory for this purpose. Thus at a time when thousands of Novices are expected on 220, the ARRL Band Plan will have to be revised, with the loss of many repeater pairs. I can't predict exactly what the Band Plan will be if we are cut back 40%, but you had better believe it will be different! Furthermore, if high power commercial 220 transmitters are installed at our repeater sites, their second harmonics will clobber more link and control channels in the 440 MHz band. What I am saying is that, even if you never plan to use 220 directly, loss of 220 to 222 will still hurt YOU! The Commission seems unaware of just how much 220 to 222 is now being used.

The Commission is also wrong about the ability of this spectrum to support the Land Mobile Service. A two MHz space would require repeaters with 1 MHz split, which is damn hard to do (that's why we use 1.6 MHz). When the commercials find that out, they may be back for another bite! In many cities, Baltimore included, TV Channel 13 will give commercial users fits on 220 to 222. So will the IF radiation from thousands of car radios. There are other technical problems, but the bottom line is that 220 to 222 is a lousy choice for Land Mobile.

To comment in opposition to the NPRM, you should file an ORIGINAL and FIVE COPIES by APRIL 6, 1987. If you can't make five copies, file anyway - your comments WILL be read. Even if late, your comments will probably still count. So, for the sake of Amateur Radio, DO IT!

If you can make extra copies, you should send one to your Senators and Congressman, and also to ARRL via Hugh Turnbull, W3ABC, and to the VHF/UHF Advisory Committee (That's me). But please, if you love Ham Radio, file SOMETHING! A sample format is on the reverse side.
