Rules--

The same station may be worked once on each band and mode. (i.e., 40 phone, 40 cw, 20 phone, etc.)

Exchange--

Send QSO #, RST, and county. Receive QSO #, RST, and ARRL Section.

Scoring--

W/VE/VO QSO's are 1 point each. DX 3 pts. Multiply QSO points by the number of ARRL sections worked.

Frequencies --

1810, 3535, 3735, 3905, 7035, 7135, 7265, 14035, 14280, 21100 21355, 28100, 28600, 50 to 50.5, and 144 to 146.

Awards--

Englewood ARA will issue a certificate to the top scorer in each county. GCARC will issue a certificate to any member making 150 or more contacts, and a prize to the top scorer.

Logs--

Forms will be available at the August meeting. Mail your log to the sponsor to be received by Sept. 15th. Check sheets are required with all entries. Notify W2FBF of your score for prizes, certificates, and crosstalk listing. As with any contest, interest is measured by the number of logs received, so be sure to send it in, however small.

The N.J. QSO party is the most successful state QSO party going because of the large number of J.J. stations who participate. Let's put our counties in from South Jersey, and make it even a bigger success.

*****INTERVIEW WITH A HAM****

Wow, I've been looking through some of my records and find that this column has appeared only once so far this year in the pages of Crosstalk. I promised our Editor at least six interviews a year, so I'd better get down to business, or I'll be getting thrown off of the staff of "Ye Olde Crosstalk." For the benefit of some of our newer club members this article has appeared in Crosstalk off and on since 1964, this being the twenty sixth of this series.

The subject of our interview this month is Steve Pakyz,

W2PZX,

Steve was born in Philadelphia, Pa., on January 25, 1918. He attended public schools in Phila. and is a graduate of North East High School. After graduating from high school, Steve attended the University of Pennsylvania where he studied Electrical Engineering for two and a half years. Steve was first licensed as W3FLU in December of 1933 and became W2PZX upon moving to New Jersey in 1942. Steve started working for R.C.A. in 1940 and at the time of his retirement in 1967 was a senior electrical designer. The Gloucester County Amateur Radio Club was organized in 1959 and Steve has been a member since 1960. He was a member of the South Jersey Radio Association for over twenty five years. prior to 1965. At present Steve is an active member of our AREC nets. He was active in RACES from the early 1950's to 1960. In 1954 Steve received the Edison Award for his services during Hurricane Hazel. (The Edison Award is issued each year by General Electric to Hams that have performed outstanding services).

Steve lost his eyesight in 1967, but is still an active Ham, operating an SB-100 on 40 Meter SSB and an HA-460 on 6 Meter AM. In the past Steve was active in politics in Deptford Township. He is an exempt fireman from the Almonesson Lake Fire

Company.
