One of the things that Field Day seems to have in common with GCARC is bad weather. Once again this year we had our share of rain, which seems to really dampen our set-up, but it really doesn't seem to dampen our enthusiasm for the exercise.

I think that this year we probably had more visitors to the Field Day site than any previous F.D. that I can remember, both club members and non-members. I honestly believe the reason for this was the publicity that we received through the efforts of Steve Asay, and also due to Amateur Radio Week activities on the preceding weekend that were under the capable guidance of Bill Conrad.

16 th ANNUAL NEW JERSEY QSO PARTY----AUGUST 16--18, 1975

The Englewood Amateur Radio Association, Inc., invites all amateurs the world over to take part in the 16th Annual New Jersey QSO Party.

**RULES:** (1) The time of the contest is from 2000 GMT Saturday August 16 to 0700 GMT Sunday August 17 and from 1300 GMT Sunday August 17 to 0200 GMT Monday August 18. (2) Phone and CW are considered the same contest. A station may be contacted once on each band--phone and CW are considered separate bands. New Jersey stations may work other New Jersey stations. (3) General call is "CQ New Jersey" or "CQ NJ." New Jersey stations are requested to identify themselves by signing "DE NJ" on CW and "New Jersey calling" on phone. Suggested frequencies are: 1810, 3535, 3735, 3905, 7035, 7135, 7235, 14035, 14280, 14280, 21100, 21355, 28100, 28600, 50-50.5, 144-146. Suggest phone activity on the even hours; 15 meters on the odd hours (1500 to 2100 GMT); 160 meters at 0500 GMT. (4) Exchange consists of QSO number, RST, and QTH (ARRL Section or country). New Jersey stations will send county for their QTH. (5) Scoring: out-of-state stations multiply number of complete contacts with New Jersey stations times the number of New Jersey counties worked (maximum of 21). New Jersey stations: W-K-VE-VO QSOs count as 1 point; DX stations count as 3 points. Multiply ~~total~~ number of points times the number of ARRL Sections (including NNJ and SNJ - maximum of 75). KP4, KH6, KL7, KZ5, etc. count as both 3 point DX contacts and as section multipliers. (6) Certificates will be awarded to the first place station in each N.J. County, ARRL Section, and Country. In addition, a second place certificate will be awarded when four or more logs are received. Novice and Technician certificates will also be awarded. (7) Logs must also show GMT date and time, band, and emission, and be received not later than September 13, 1975. The first contact for each claimed multiplier must be indicated and numbered and check list of contacts and multipliers should be included. Multi-operator stations should be noted and calls of participating operators listed. Multi-operator stations should be noted and calls of participating operators listed. Logs and comments should be sent to Englewood Amateur Radio Association, Inc., 303 Tenafly Road, Englewood, New Jersey 07631. A size #10 SASE should be included for results. (8) Stations planning active participation in New Jersey are requested to advise the EARA by August 2nd of your intentions so that we may plan for full coverage from all counties. Portable and mobile operation is encouraged.

LES BELLES -- by Rose Ellen--WA2FGS

The National Association of Music Teachers took a "People-to-People" tour in 1974 and again 1975. This tour was initiated by President Eisenhower as a goodwill promotion and he is quoted as saying "the tour will be an understanding between people and a passport to peace".

Representatives from 17 different states included WA2FGS being the only one from New Jersey to go on this mission.

Briefly, the tour covered the following:

LES BELLES (Cont'd.)

Kennedy airport to Amsterdam, Holland where we visited the Allsmeer Flower Auction, the Madurodam Minature Village, the Delft Factory, The Hague, the American Embassy and the Conservatory where teachers and students alike were our dinner guests at the Hotel Pultizer. A visit to the Gassan diamond factory (largest exporter in the world) a tour of the church where Rembrandt is buried, the museum where many of the originals are hung including the painting used by Dutch Masters' cigars which is in life size was most enjoyable. This chestnut tree lined city also gave us the opportunity to take a long boat ride on many of the canals. Dutch Airlines to East Berlin and a train to Leipzig, Germany where the sunrise came at 4 A.M. This 800 year old city had many lime trees and lilacs growing. We visited the University (re-named Karl Marx in 1953), The St. Thomas Church and heard the famous boy's choir and saw the organ used by J.S. Bach. There is a new organ presently used which was donated by Albert Schweitzer. At the Conservatory we met the teachers and heard the students play and also had them as our guests during our stay. A special chair designed by Director Fisher is found throughout the school. It has several layers of wood so that different sized people can immediately change the level of the chair before the piano. Visited Neissen porcelain factory where the Dresden china is made and the Albertsburg Castle where they rang the bells especially for us. Visited a Russian Church - notice no organ and only acapella music here. A 120 ft. high steeple was of 4 kilogram gold. Motor coach on to Dresden where beer also is served at all meals we attended concerts and saw the Opera Fidela. By train an all day trip thru Czechoslovakia. Meal on trip was Ox marinated in wine. Rode along the Elva River arriving in Vienna in time for the Corpus Christi procession from St. Stephens' Church and also about the same time as President Ford's arrival. We visited the Embassy and the Conservatory and saw the Opera Toska. Going by Russian airlines to Kiev, we found this to be a beautiful city that is 60% parks and it was also very evident that all males were clean shaven and short hair. Many poplar trees were seen around the city. The subways were spotless and all streets were crossed underground. Vodka was served at all meals along with several wines at lunch and dinner. We saw the Opera Barber of Saville and also visited the Conservatory and heard many artists perform. These people were our guests at a restaurant outside of the city. Again Russian airlines to Budapest, Hungary where we had the opportunity to see and hear the native instrument the Cymbala. We attended a Folklore concert and had a complete tour of the Opera House and saw many possessions of Litz. Mr. Davis of the Embassy spent much time with us. We also saw the Ballet - The Fountains of Bakhchiseray.

By Swissair over to Zurich we spent the greater part of one day in Switzerland and were able to see the beauty of the Alps. Swissair again to Barcelona, Spain we visited the Palace of Music Conservatory and saw the Flanenco dancers. Many musical instruments were found in the museum collected from old estates. Several bellows organs were available for us to play if we wished. Visit the church where Columbus returned in 1493 and in the front, folk dancers appear in costume, daily. We took the sky cable ride across the Mediterranean Sea to view the city at 500 feet up. On our return we changed planes in Madrid and after seven hours and 15 minutes on the 747 Jumbo arrived back in Kennedy and the jet lag right with us. This report has been condensed to save space.
