EQUIDMENT DEVIEWThe Alinco DR1200T "DataRadio"

Recently, I began looking for a 2-meter rig for my primary packet radio station. I had been using a handheld and an amplifier, but wanted some- thing with a bit more "Oomph". I also wanted to use my handheld and amp for other things. I decided that if I was going to spend the money on new equipment, it was going to be something that would last for a few years and allow me to go to greater data rates than just 1200 baud. This ruled out a number of radios, since I needed "true" Frequency Modulation, not Phase Modulation as most rigs have. I also wanted to be able to do any mods required easily and quickly, and of course, it had to be inexpensive.

This led me to the line of equipment offered by Alinco. They recently began marketing a new radio targeted specifically for the packet crowd. AES had it

in their catalog for \$249 (best price at the time) and, in a moment of weakness, I ordered it. After approxmately 5 months of 24-hour-a-day operation, I can enthusiastically recommend this radio to anyone seriously looking for a good, clean and solidly performing rig. The filtering circuits, which are bypassed if you reconfigure the radio for 9600 baud, are excellent. In side-byside comparisons to other radios, the DR1200T was the clear winner. It has also performed well with some 4800 baud modems I have been designing.

All this would normally lead me to say I had no regrets in purchasing the radio, and if it were not for just one thing, that would be true. The problem is not actually with the radio, per say. It's just that after I bought it, AES put the DR-110 on sale for \$289. Instead of the 1200T's 25 watts, the 110 delivers 45 watts. Plus, it come complete with a DTMF microphone. (The 1200T has NO microphone, just a cable for your

TNC.) Now while 25 watts has been more than adequate for the majority of my needs, it would be nice occasionally, to have the extra 3db. Besides, with twice the power and for only \$40 more, who wouldn't like to have a "spare" mike?

The 110 is effectively the same radio, and uses the same 9600 baud modification. (Which, incidentally, takes less than 15 minutes to do.) I guess, then, my opinion is this: The Alinco DR1200-T makes a GREAT transceiver for your packet station. However, if your power supply can handle it, and you have the extra \$40 dollars, get the 110 while they are still on sale.

Either way, you should be very pleased with the results you get.

Novice Changes Droposed ARRL BULLETIN 69 ARLB069

The FCC has issued a notice of proposed rule making in PR DOCKET 92-154 that would require Novice class license examinations to be administered by the volunteer examiner program, which now administers all other license class examinations. The plan is essentially as proposed by the ARRL and W5YI volunteer examiner coordinators and described in April 1992 QST, Page 63. The FCC'S NPRM notes that the codeless Technician class is now the entry-level license of choice over the Novice class, that the FCC is burdened by an application error rate of 9.4% for Novices as compared to only 0.8% for VE-administered examinations. that no Pass-Versus-Fail records are available from Novice examinations, as they are for VE-administered exams.

The FCC believes bringing Novice exams under the VEC system would be in the public interest, saying the VEC system "has demonstrated both its efficiency and its integrity. We conclude that Novice class amateur operator examinations would benefit from those same two virtues." Opposition to this plan has been primarily a concern that Novice examinations would not be as readily available, especially in sparsely populated areas of the country. League's response was that the explosion in new Technician class licenses since the advent of the Codeless Technician class in April 1991, would indicate that VE examinations are readily available in most areas. The FCC NPRM did not directly address the questions, although alluded to it in noting that the Novice is no longer the preponderant first license. The comment deadline is October 9, 1992. Reply comment deadline is November 9, 1992.

Protect Your Receiver

To protect your receiver's input circuitry in high-RF environment (such as multi-operator contesting Field-Day), solder a grain-o-wheat bulb in series

with the antenna line inside the rig to act as a fuse. The resistance will be low when the filament is cold and the bulb will burn out if too much RF gets into the circuit. The Radio Shack 272-1139 bulb (1.5 volts at 25 mA) is a good choice.

HAMFEST VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!

SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST (SET) JUNE 13, 1992.

CRITIQUE: Gloucester county ARES, RACES had 22 amateur radio operators take part in the exercise, starting at 8:00 a.m. and lasting until approx. 12:30. Some 45 messages were passed between Woodbury EOC the eight township's, the mobile comm. van, county comm. center in Clayton and the Red Cross. Most messages were in formal form although some were casual comments. In general most of the operations of the amateur radio operators went smoothly. In Deptford, Franklin, Harrison, Logan, Monroe, National Park and Washington Twps. things went like clock work. Keep in mind this was the first time some of the operators had been involved in traffic As such we teamed new operators with old timers so as not to cause problems.

However there were some trouble spots:

- 1- The operator in the Red Cross center had antenna problems that caused him to be weak but not unreadable. He went out in the parking lot to his car and used his mobile radio for a time then found a very good spot inside the building. The Red Cross asked if we would put an outside antenna on their building to solve the problem for the future. We are working on doing that.
- 2- In the county EOC some of the messages given to the operators were so poorly written that neither the operator nor the person who wrote the message could read it. Additionally in the EOC county officials answering formal messages were not writing formal answers causing much confusion.
- 3- In the Clayton Comm. center the operators were very disappointed in the use of their services. The people in Clayton had no idea of the capabilities the amateurs had or why we were there. The operators were friendly, but made no use of the amateurs. There was at least one time when Clayton complained as to not having communications with the mobile comm. van.

They asked the amateurs if we could provide the needed communications. This is not a new problem. Clayton has never used the amateurs in any of the exercises. This is a real problem as there are times the amateurs can communicate when it is not possible to do so from the comm. center.

4- Mobile Comm. van was probably the largest concern to the amateurs. Clayton the amateurs were not aloud to enter the van as there was no room in side. They were forced to follow it to Geetes dinner where it sat until 9:30 am one and a half hours into the SET. When officials in the comm, van left the dinner they realized they had forgotten their radio walkie talkies leaving them back at Clayton comm. center. A car was sent back to Clayton to pick up the walkie talkies, the van went to a fire house then on to the disaster site. The amateurs again tried to gain access to the comm. van. They were told there was no use being in the van as their equipment did not work. The van was parked in such a place that if there were a real emergency it would have been destroyed. The amateurs are very concerned as to how those in the van knew the amateur radio equipment was not working. Amateurs used the van for a previous drill and all was working fine. It is against federal law for any one not having an amateur license to operate amateur equipment. It was made very clear to the two amateur operators assigned to the van that they were not wanted. This situation needs to be corrected.

The ARES RACES amateur radio operators enjoy the opportunity to serve the community and hope that their services in emergency and non emergency situations will be useful. We would be more than happy to discuss or demonstrate the capabilities of amateur radio communications to anyone necessary toward solving the above mentioned problems.

It ended up that everybody blamed somebody when nobody did what anybody could have done.

Did you get it?

A MATTER OF OPINION

Nearly every organization or club has a problem similar to our own: Most of the work required for the welfare and even the survival of G.C.A.R.C. is accomplished by a core of relatively few people despite repeated appeals to the general membership for assistance. This small number of members continues year in and year out to perform the required responsibilities and tasks for our club's ongoing operation and success in reaching its objectives.

Each one of us, I believe, would agree that this is not fair. However, it is very obvious that each one of us is not prepared to make an investment of his or her time to correct this widely recognized problem in our club. Payment of dues alone, plus participation in the club's activities — including the basic objectives of amateur radio — is not in itself an assurance that our club will remain vital and survive. So what can be done in order to correct this widely perceived inequity? The inequity can even be underscored by the obvious fact that the majority benefits from the heavy contribution of the few.

In business, or even in life in general, sound judgement dictates that to correct a serious problem, often serious or drastic corrective action is absolutely necessary. Unless we in G.C.A.R.C. are satisfied that we do not have a problem — that in fact our present and past manner of operation is completely acceptable — we should take some drastic action to change a continuing situation which I believe is not at all satisfactory to the majority of our members.

As most of you are well aware, any proposed change will have its supporters and non-supporters. Those who would not support a change in the status quo will put forward all kinds of objections reflecting their individual opposition to a change. Some of their opinions and their logic will sound very convincing. What you should ask yourself is: Do these arguments against a change benefit the majority of our club members, or only a selective minority? Is any change needed? And if so, is it equitable, reasonable and generally beneficial to the majority of our membership?

If you believe that some change is needed — and not only needed, but long overdue — then consider carefully and with an open mind the following option.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

G.C.A.R.C. IS AN ORGANIZATION WHICH IS OPERATED UNDER A MEMBERSHIP-APPROVED CONSTITUTION. THE CLUB MEETINGS ARE CONDUCTED ACCORDING TO ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER. CONSEQUENTLY, A MOTION IS ALWAYS IN ORDER. THEREFORE, I INTEND TO MAKE THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT AND MOTION AT OUR NEXT MEETING:

IN ADDITION TO THE PRESENT RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR INITIAL AND CONTINUING MEMBERSHIP IN G.C.A.R.C., AND BASED ON A RADICALLY NEW CONCEPT THAT — CONTINUING MEMBERSHIP IN G.C.A.R.C. SHOULD ALSO BE A PRIVILEGE THAT IS EARNED IN ORDER TO BE RETAINED — I MOVE THAT THE CLUB CONSTITUTION BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS...

"DURING JANUARY OF EACH YEAR THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE WILL REVIEW EACH MEMBER'S CONTRIBUTION TO THE GOOD AND WELFARE OF THE CLUB, PROVIDING HOWEVER THAT SUCH MEMBER HAS BEEN A CLUB MEMBER FOR NO LESS THAN THE PAST TWELVE CONSECUTIVE MONTHS. IF, BY MAJORITY VOTE OF THE COMMITTEE, A MEMBER HAS NOT MADE AN ADEQUATE CONTRIBUTION TO G.C.A.R.C DURING THE YEAR, THE COMMITTEE WILL RECOMMEND TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THAT SUCH MEMBER SHOULD BE SUBJECT TO SUSPENSION/EXPULSION IN ACCORDIANCE WITH ARTICLE VI, SECTION 10., OF THE CONSTITUTION. FURTHER, THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE BY A MAJORITY VOTE WILL HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO CONSIDER WHETHER A MEMBER'S PRIOR YEAR OR YEARS OF CONTRIBUTION TO THE GOOD AND WELFARE OF THE CLUB CAN JUSTIFIABLY BE THE QUALIFICATION FOR CONTINUING MEMBERSHIP.

A MEMBER'S QUALIFYING CONTRIBUTION FOR RETAINING HIS OR HER MEMBERSHIP WILL BE REVIEWED ANNUALLY BY THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE, INCLUDING ITS CHAIRPERSON, SHALL CONSIST OF FIVE MEMBERS AND WILL BE APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE BY-LAWS, PARAGRAPH 6.

CONTINUING GENERAL MEMBERSHIP INPUT TO THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE IS NOT ONLY WELCOME, BUT ALSO NECESSARY, IN ORDER TO REFLECT THE DIVERSIFIED VIEWS OF THE MEMBERS.

WHEN APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT, THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE MEMBERS WILL NOT CONSIST OF ANY CURRENT CLUB OFFICERS OR TRUSTEES."
