DX Dope

As you know, DXers get their kicks out of ragchewing with hams halfway around the world and across the wide oceans. Unfortunately, it doesn't take very long before the US ham finds out that to ragchew with another ham from some rare place like Kure Island, is next to impossible. The ham on Kure Is. does not live there (no one does), and, because Kure counts as a country, there are about a zillion other ham station signals all wanting a contact with Kure. The Kure operator simply gives out signal reports in rapid order such that all stations can say they worked Kure and eventually get the QSL card. Hence, the DXer finds himself chasing down countries and zones and prefixes, etc. to qualify for all of the various DX awards and certificates. This in itself becomes addictive, sort of like coin and/or stamp collecting (consider the DXCC Challenge Award, for example), and requires a lot of perseverance and a first class operating station. For those of you who may be novices at DXing, or even for those who are considering this area of interest, be alert to the DXpedition to Peter I Island which will start somewhere around February 18th and will run for about 2 weeks. Peter I Island is perhaps the most remote place on the planet earth; located some 300 miles off the Antarctica coast in the Bellinghausen Sea, it is accessible only by ice breaker type ships and helicopters. The last DXpedition there was in 1994. The large international group going there this time is well funded, well equipped, very experienced, and should give us a very satisfying operation. They will be on all amateur bands and modes. So, even the most modest stations will most likely be able to work this group on some band, perhaps during the second week when most of the big gun stations will have died down. Give it a shot, for it could be many years before you get another chance at this rare entity.

And, speaking of Dxpeditions, GCARC's very own Dave, W2YC, and Harry, AA2WN, are expected to arrive on North Caicos Island in the Caribbean and will be operational about February 16th. They plan on operating the ARRL DX CW contest the week of February 19/20 using the call VP5Y. They will depart on February 22nd and will use VP5/ Home calls before and after the contest. Look for them on all of the HF bands mostly using CW. They are especially anxious to work GCARC club members both during and after the contest and will QSL 100 percent for Turks and Caicos Is. It certainly isn't everyday that our club members head-off for far away lands and operate (K2JF was one several years ago that went to Galapagos Is.), so be sure and look for Harry and Dave. So, what else is out there this month?

Club Member Profile

This month [Crosstalk](#) profiles Anthony Gargano, N2SS:

My route to ham radio was probably not untypical of those that entered the hobby back in the '50's. I'll start from the beginning. As a youngster I was a big fan of the Philadelphia Athletics baseball team and my dad used to take me to ball games. But when I was 12 years old the A's moved to Kansas City, so I adopted the New York Yankees as 'my team'. (I was a staunch American Leaguer - forget those Phillies!) Well, I needed a way to listen to those Yankee ball games and soon became very interested in radio sensitivity as I had to 'pull in' New York from our South Philadelphia row house in order to listen to the games. That led me into broadcast band DXing. Seeing my interest in broadcast band DXing, an uncle gave me an old Hallicrafters S-38C shortwave receiver as a gift. That got me into SWL DXing. During the course of my listening I used to hear these conversations interspersed between the foreign shortwave bands. I found I was listening more and more to 'those guys who were talking and sounding like they were having lots of fun'. I asked my uncle what they were all about and he explained that they were 'radio hams' - something he was interested in as a youth but never pursued.

I decided I wanted to become a 'radio ham' and at the time a magazine called Popular Communications used to run a write in column entitled "Help Us Obtain Our Ham Licenses". (Pop Com was the must magazine for SWL's at that time.) I wrote to the magazine and they listed my name and address in the column. I was soon contacted by a gentleman that introduced himself as a member of SPARK, the South Philadelphia Amateur Radio Klub, and he invited me to attend a meeting. There I found my 'Elmer' who helped me at age 15 to learn Morse code. He also gave me a dog-eared copy of the Handbook to study theory in between the Morse lessons. I passed my Novice exam and was issued the call, KN3EHP, in early 1958 and have been active ever since. I moved to NJ with my XYL in 1969 and was issued the call W2EHB. For a brief period in the mid 1970's the FCC allowed Extra Class licensees to request a call sign of their choice. I always liked the idea of using "Sugar Sugar" or "dit-dit-dit dit-dit-dit" in a pile-up so I requested N2SS from the then newly opened N block.

From day one I've always been a DXer and enjoy the chase, whether it be a new country or a new IOTA. I guess my 'thing' is that I'm always ready for a challenge. There is no DX oriented club in the area so I am a member of the next best thing - Frankford Radio Club, a DX contest club. To maintain balance and perspective of our hobby I belong to GCARC which is a great all-around radio club. I first became a member of GCARC in 1970 or '71 when the club was meeting in Pitman. It was then that I met the gentleman of SJ DXers and GCARC stalwart, Shorty, W2SUA. A silent key for several years now, Shorty will be forever loom large in the annals of the GCARC.

My family situation has made it impossible for me to make club meetings in recent months but I am still very active and look forward to getting back to a GCARC meeting and renewing acquaintances.
