I'm writing this month's message sitting in London, as I prepare for my mini-expedition to EI, which by the time you read this, will have hopefully gone smoothly. A few members have asked me to relate more about the trip to EI, so I will take this opportunity to fill you in on the Emerald Isle. I'll have to ask my host John, EI7BA, if the EI prefix has anything to do with the nickname Emerald Isle, but I suspect it's more to do with the Irish name for Ireland, which is Eire. Having flown over Ireland many times on the way to London, it is a striking view from the air. I have never seen such a rich green and lush landscape from the air. It's easy to see how it has earned the nickname of the Emerald Isle. The first trip to Cork materialized during one of my trips to London, which was in late November 2004. Always trying to think of an interesting place to operate on short notice, I started looking at the excellent DXHoliday website, which has a wealth of information for the ham who plans to travel and operate. The website is <http://www.dxholiday.com> and is maintained by Ken, K2KW. I noticed with some interest that there were no listings for Ireland. Granted, Ireland is not terribly rare, and there are a number of locals who get on the HF bands quite regularly, including some modest contest entries. The big contest station is the multi-multi EI7M, which many of you likely have in the log.

I stumbled on my host's website by accident (<http://www.iol.ie/~bravo/index.htm>). John Tait, EI7BA, is quite the antenna experimenter and has a couple of acres in a rural area east of Cork, in the southeastern corner of Ireland, so plenty of room for antennas and a really low-noise quiet QTH. We traded a couple of e-mails and he invited me to operate CQWW CW. Wow! This was great. I was already in London, and the flight to Cork is only about 40 minutes. Better yet, I had brought only my IC-706 to London, and John, EI7BA, has a Yaesu Mark V, an FT1000MP, and a pair of Alpha 78s. Plans were quickly made and the flight booked. My XYL, Mildred, was also excited, having never been to Ireland before. We did some sightseeing the first day, but I was itching to get over to check out John's station. It proved a lot more difficult finding his QTH than I had imagined! The roads in Ireland are not generally named or marked, most of them being what we would consider two-lane country roads. Shoulders are narrow and often you must stop to let the oncoming car squeeze by. Sure there are major highways between the big cities, but once you exit one of these you will have fun figuring out where you are going. Also, Ireland drives on the left like the UK, the steering wheel is on the right and automatic transmissions are rare. This means you will become quickly familiar with left-handed shifting if you are going to drive in Ireland or the UK!

It was getting near dark and we still had not found John's QTH. After driving around and getting lost a few times, about an hour or so later, we stopped a postman who was very helpful and we arrived at our destination. We were quickly ushered into John's lovely

country home, and quickly became friends with him and his wife Eunice. After tea we went to the shack, where I checked out the setup and made sure it was contest ready for the weekend. The following day we spent sightseeing in the East Cork area, and visited the Tower of Cloyne, which was built by monks in the 10th Century. Taking a tour is easy, you ask the clerk at the post office across the street for the key! If you go inside, you have to climb a ladder to the doorway. Evidently, back in medieval times, the entrance was elevated to keep out the invaders or would-be conquerors. The tower served as a lookout and therefore had strategic importance. Ireland is full of many old buildings and churches like the ones we visited and the people are really nice. Strangers are quick to smile and say good morning or good afternoon, as the case may be.

Operating a contest from Europe is an interesting experience and requires adjusting your attitude and planning. First of all, the contest starts at midnight local time. This means you will be starting on the low bands since it is already dark. Just as the US stations want to work EU for 3 points in CQWW, EU wants to work the US or JA for 3 points. However, unlike the US, which has only a small number of multipliers (mostly the Caribbean) with a small ham population, EU has a dense concentration of amateurs in many countries. It's real easy to get 50 multipliers on 80M for instance, just call CQ and all of EU will come back to you. The down side is that these Qs are only worth 1 point, not 3, so while you feel busy and have a full log, you may not have a lot of points! This is what happened to me in CQWW CW. I had a great time operating, and had a lot of Qs, but I had lousy openings to the US. Also, imagine the strong stations in Sweepstakes, and trying to hear DX in between. That is the problem you face operating in Europe, heavy local QRM making it hard to copy the US stations.

The contest went well from EI7BA's location and several local EI stations stopped by to say hello, including a couple of the ops from EI7M, including Dave EI4BZ. The East Cork Contest Group is the most active radio club in the southern part of Ireland. Like clubs everywhere, the challenge is attracting new members. An interesting note on call sign sequences and licensing in EI, there are no regional identifiers. The call signs are issued sequentially and started with EI1 (this would be a really old-timer), and is currently somewhere in the EI9 sequence. Any US ham can operate automatically without any special license under the CEPT agreement, which allows US hams to operate essentially anywhere in Europe (Andorra C3 being the exception, no one, not even other EU hams can operate there).

Well, in WPX CW I will hopefully take advantage of the high density of EU stations. The prefix is the multiplier, and while EU will also count as 1 point from EI, there should be a rich variety of prefixes. The strategy is to work as many US stations on 40 and 80, which count 6 points on those bands. Well, that's about it. The 2005 WPX CW contest will be history by the time you read this, and I hope to have worked you in the contest. I have special full color photo QSLs which were made by Gennady UX5UO, which will be sent if I work you. If you ever get the chance, be sure to visit Ireland, it truly is the Emerald Isle.
