So check with the band chairman of the band and mode of your choice and sign-up for your trick at the mike or key. Ron, WA2EOB, is general chairman and assures us that all is in readiness. Traditionally, every able bodied club member contributes something to or for F.D .--- either helping to set-up antennas, operate, take down, etc. Don't you be left-out. See you on the 24th!

OMNIDIRECTIONAL ARRAYS.....

For many applications, it is desirable and important to provide an antenna pattern that is uniform for all horizontal angles. The over-all antenna gain under these conditions will usually have an undesirably low value unless radiators are stacked vertically to provide directivity in the vertical plane. Many of the basic radiators such as loops, dipoles, or sleeve antennas possessing axial symmetry, can be arranged in a vertical array for this purpose. The turnstile antenna consists of two half-wave length dipoles crossed at 90° and excited in phase quadrature. are usually stacked with half-wave spacing and fed in phase. The superturnstile is used to increase the band-width over which it is possible to maintain a low standing wave ratio. The "dipoles" consist of vertical fins or wire structures. The fin length is usually less than three-quarter wave length, and the vertical separation is approximately one wave length.

The impedances of the driven antenna is lowered by parasitic elements. A folded dipole can be used as the driven element to increase the input resistance of the antenna. The gain of a parasitic array depends upon the number of elements in the array and their spacing. With one reflector or director spaced as to obtain maximum gain, values of approximately 5 db

over a half-wave antenna will be obtained. A three element array with one director and one reflector properly spaced will yield a maximum gain of over 7 db compared to a half-wave antenna. A four element array consisting of a reflector and two directors properly spaced will yield a maximum gain of over 9 db compared to a half-wave antenna.

Many surprises await the ham who will take the time to experiment with the different kinds of antennas. It hasn't been too many years ago that antennas couldn't be purchased and the ham had to build his own if he wanted to get out of his back yard. Today there are still many kinds and types of antennas being built by the true hams, and they are not relying strictly upon basics. Through trying and building, many new ideas can and will be established by the ham. A good example of this is the work done on the various antennas used in the moon bounce. To illustrate a point, several years ago, when I was climbing the ham ladder, one of the fellow hams that worked with us actually loaded and transmitted using a large tomato can for an antenna while some others used a rainspout. It was interesting to see the various gadgets and the results obtained with them. This was fun, and true hamming at its best. We have enough newer members of our club, and this should offer some kind of a challenge to them. if you can't come up with an antenna home-brewed that will really add points to our field day score. What better time to surprise your fellow I can remember another time when I saw some of the weirdest types of antennas during a hidden transmitter hunt. But let me tell you, they really worked and produced results. Talk to some of the older hams and find out their opinions.

NEW NET TO BE ACTIVATED

Several months ago, at the beginning of this year to be exact, your Club's Board of Directors decided to establish a "Novice Net" on 15 meters. To date there has been no action on this matter, except some crystals for 21.225 MHz. have been ordered. To overcome this apparent lack of initiative on everyone's part, I have decided to establish a "Novice Net" on 21.225 MHz. in association with the Gloucester County A.R.E.C. This net is in no way to interfere with any other net that may at present exist or any net that may be established in the future. The purpose of this net is to get holders of the Novice license interested in net operations and to give them some experience in operating with other stations with similar interests. This net will not be a traffic net nor will it be an active part of your Gloucester County A.R.E.C. programs. It is my hope that, after gaining some experience in net operations, our Novices will turn to our 10 meter or 6 meter nets when they upgrade their license to either the Technician or General grade.

I will appoint John White, WA2MEM, an Assistant E.C. for 15 meters to help me get this venture off the ground. The net will meet each Monday evening at 8:30 P.M. local time, starting June 12th. Either John, WA2MEM, or myself, WA2SEA, will be net control station until such a time as a Novice gains enough experience to assume this important function. Crystals will hopefully be available for 21.225 MHz. at a nominal cost of \$1.50 each. LES BELLES

Okay all you gals, it is up to us to keep the food lined up for Field Day. The best way to make sure all operators will do their best is to have lots of food around to have during the 27-hour period of the contest. As a suggestion of what we all can do to be prepared, here's something you may like to try:

Would be helpful if some portable outdoor grills would be available...

OUTDOOR BARBECUED FRANKFURTERS

1/2 cup chopped onion

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

3 tablespoons vinegar

3 tablespoons brown sugar

l cup chili sauce

2 cups canned apple sauce

1 teaspoon salt

1 pound frankfurters

Saute onion in butter until light brown. Add vinegar, brown sugar, chili sauce, apple cause and salt. Add frankfurters and simmer over hot coals about 20 minutes. Serve in split, toasted frankfurter rolls, with spoonfuls of sauce. Makes 8 servings. Amounts can be doubled up for Field Day use.

BAKED BEANS WITH DEVILED HAM AND ONIONS

1 can plumped, chopped prunes (about 16)

6 plumped prune halves--for garnish

3 tablespoons chopped onion

1-1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine

2 cans (1 pound) pork & beans in tomato sauce

1 can (2-1/4 ounce) deviled ham

1/4 teaspoon dry mustard

1/2 cup tomato sauce

1/4 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup onion slices

Saute cut-up prunes and onions in butter or margarine in skillet over low heat until onions become transparent, about 5 minutes. Pour beans into medium-sized bowl. Add sauted prunes and onions, deviled ham, mustard, tomato sauce and brown sugar. Stir well. Pour into 1-1/2 quart buttered

casserole. Place onion rings on top of beans. Arrange prune halves, cut side down, on top. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 40-45 minutes, until hot and bubbly. Makes 5 to 6 servings. Can be kept hot at Field Day site using your fondue or any type warmer you have.

OLD FASHIONED POTATO SALAD

6 cooked potatoes, cubed 1/4 cup thinly sliced radishes 4 1/2 cup diced celery 1 c

1/4 cup minced onion 4 hard-cooked eggs, dived 1 cup mayonnaise

Combine all ingredients and mix lightly. Chill well. Mound in a serving bowl on lettuce cups and garnish with hard-cooked eggs and tomato wedges. Makes 6 servings.

HOLD THE PRESS!!



Field Day site is in the Army Reserve Center located on Rt 130 approximately 3 miles north of Pennsgreve. It is surrounded by an iron fence and at the entrance are two (2) flashing amber lights which you cannot miss. Proceed thru the gate past the muard house, pass the chapel (1) on your left to a long two story white barracks. Turn right on a dirt/gravel road which runs alongside and deadends onto the open field at a ball field and small bleachers. The entire field from the bleachers, a small storage shack, and part of the two story barracks is ours to use. The Army will provide three (3) squad tents, one to be erected 50' nw of the heliocopter pad windsock pole and two adjacent to the large tree at the north end of the field. The barracks can be used for sleeping and includes a latrine and washing facilities.
