Legislative Report by K2JF

Cable TV companies are allowed to use various frequencies to REBROADCAST their programming which includes the amateur bands. For example, cable Channel 18 is allocated 145.25 MHz (amateur 2 meter band). Their authority allows them to radiate 0.2 microvolts/meter at 10 feet using a half wave dipole as reference. Check your cable installation, and if you hear Channel 18 of your cable installation, let them know.

ARRL has filed two proposals for Rulemaking. "Requesting amendment to Part 97 to provide amateur radio privileges in the 10.1 to 10.15 MHz frequency band and to expand the 20 meter telephone subbands."

RM-3855 proposes that a power level of 250 watts (Al, Fl - 300 band or less) be authorized to General Class amateurs and up using the new 10 MHz band. The League asked for early Commission action since the band could become available to U.S. amateurs as early as January 1982.

RM-3860 asked for "relief" of severe overcrowding in the telephony subband of the 14 MHz amateur band. The proposal adds 50 KHz of additional phone spectrum to the General and Extra Class levels and 25 KHz for Advanced Class. The newly suggested 20 meter phone segments are:

Interested parties may file comments to support or oppose the petitions up until the time the FCC rules on them. Suggest you file before June 15, 1981.

The United States and The Gambia (prefix C5) have agreed to permit the exchange of third party messages, but not phone patches, effective April 15, 1981. The messages must be of technical or personal nature not important enough to justify transmission by the public telecommunications network. (Tnx QST).

Historic ship looks for contacts: The cruiser OLYMPIA Association is proud to announce the opening of the first Amateur Radio station aboard a United States Naval Shrine. The cruiser U.S.S. OLYMPIA at Penns-Landing on the Delaware River in Philadelphia is currently on the air. A special full operating week-end is planned for May 30 & 31st. Times and frequencies 1300Z Sat. to 2000Z Sun. Frequencies for CW 3590, 7050, 14050, 21090, 28150; frequencies for phone 3890, 7235, 14285, 21360, 28600. Novice operations are planned as well on local 2 meters.

Do You Know that there are now \$29 broadcast stations using 121 frequencies in our 80, \$10, and 20 meter bands! QRM?

The "MEAT" of S.329 (Caldwater bill) His legislation will eventually eliminate one of the amateur operator's biggest headaches that of interference with nearby radios and televisions. The Bill would allow the FCC to set reinimum standards for radio and television receivers to make them less succeptible to interference; the standards to be applied to all receivers remarkable to interference; the standards to be applied to all receivers remarkable term for amateurs from five to ten years, allow those with higher class licenses to administer license tests for those seeking entry-level licenses, and permit the FCC to use amateurs and CB-radio operators to monitor unlicensed operators or persons violating FCC rules. The FCC would be able to prohibit delivery of radio-transmitting equipment to unlicensed individuals.

GCARC Bike-A-Thon Participation

With Chick, WAZUSI, at the helm, about 26 GCARC hams provided expert 2M communications for the May 3rd Gloucester County Bike-A-Thon for the benefit of Retarded Citizens. Simplex operation was utilized over the 7 separate routes with repeater operation reserved for contact with officials and coordinators.

A second Bike-A-Thon (American Cancer Society) is scheduled towards the end of July which will run from Philadelphia to Atlantic City. 45 hams will be needed to assist the (expected) 3000 bikers. DX Information (Tnx to KE2M)

Desecheo Island. Expect to hear KP2A running three transmitters with as many as 12 operators from Desecheo Island for one week starting 8 June. QSLS will be handled by AF2C.

Sri Lanka. Steve, DJ1US/N5SB is currently signing 4S7US and is presently quite active. Check 40 KHz up from the band edges on CW. QSL via DF2RG.

Central African Republic. Bill, TL8WH, is frequently on 14215 KHz after Ø1ØØZ. (Note: Ck with WA2NPD if you wish to work Bill).

New Caledonia. Look for FK8CW on 14220 KHz around 1000Z. QSLS VLO to K2IJL.

Cocos Keeling Islands. VK9CCT/VK9Y is now VK9YA and favors 10 meter SSB.

American Phoenix Islands. Bad news for those needing KH1. The proposed operation from KH1 by KS6DV and others has been postponed indefinitely.

San Marino. MlIPA is now active through 24 May on 80 through 10 meters. QSL via F6CXJ.

Spratly. There is still no confirmation that a Japanese will commence operation from Spratly on 26 May, but it wouldn't hurt to check 15 and 20 meters starting then.

Bangladesh. Another operator is due to arrive at S2BTF on 2 June. VU2ALQ reports that the station is in order and should be very active soon.

Bhutan. A51PN has been very active on 2851Ø KHz at Ø1ØØ and 13ØØZ.

Franz Josef Land. YLlP has been heard and worked on or around 14050 KHz at 0400Z and 1430Z.

Willis Island. VK9ZD makes a daily appearance on 40 metersat 1100Z, transmitting on 7135 KHz and listening on 7155 KHz. Also reported on 14235 KHz at 1100Z.

Tunisia. 3V8BZ can be found daily on 14205 KHz at 1700Z.

Bulletins of Interest

The Federal Communications Commission decided today to lift most restrictions on the amateur 1800 to 2000 KHz band. Some protection must remain for Canadian LORAN stations in the Northeast operating on 1950 KHz. Accordingly, some band segment and power restrictions remain, with respect to 1900 to 2000 KHz. All restrictions will be lifted from the frequencies 1800 to 1900 KHz. The effective date has not been released but should be within the next two months. Monitor this station for a further bulletin.

Triennial Region 1 IARU Conference opens in London April 27, with VE3CJ, W2HD, and W1RU representing IARU Headquarters and the ARRL. 9V1RH and a JARL representative will attend for Region 3, and YV5BPC for Region 2. They'll be reviewing WARC decisions and implementation of the new bands, proposed U.S. phone band expansion, and VHF/UHF band planning.

QST'S contest editor Tom Frenaye, KlKI, has resigned from the league headquarters staff to go into private business. His slot is being taken over by Mark Wilson, AA2Z. (Ed. Note: Ever hear of this guy?).

Russia's "Woodpecker" is to be the subject of an organized international protest on May 1, the May Day Russian National Holiday. The protest effort originated in Australia, and will attempt to emphasize global objections to the Russian interference by bombarding that country's embassies and legations with written and telephone complaints. Thanks Chawed Rag.

Mental incompetence is grounds for a license denial, FCC's Chief Administrative Law Judge Lenore Ehrig has ruled in a review of K6EOA's case. He's the Los Angeles amateur who was arrested and jailed

after threatening the lives of two FCC engineers who attempted to inspect his station during a jamming investigation in 1979, (HRR 272, 274, 333). Federal charges were later dropped after he was judged mentally incompetent, and he later pled guilty to state charges resulting from the incident. This latest decision came during a hearing on K6EOA's license. The judge also ruled that an applicant for an amateur license does agree to abide by applicable regulations, including those that concern prohibited communications.

Operation from China has been promised for next fall by a group of suburban Chicago amateurs. They report they've been in touch with high officials of the People's Republic of China, and have been promised (verbally) that they'll be able to enter the country in September and operate SSB only using their U.S. callsigns/BY. The group, from the Echo DX Club, have also been told by their contact that seven Australian amateurs have also received similar permission and should be on the air very soon.
