GLOUCESTER COUNTY (S.N.J.) EMERGENCY PLAN

The following plan is to be used in the event of a disaster that incapacitates the normal communications facilities in the Gloucester County area.

The first thing to be considered is the need for such a plan. In recent years many changes have taken place in the field of emergency communications in our rapidly expanding area. At this time (Spring of 1984) the normal channels of communications are very adequate for most emergency situations. Nearly all the local municipalities in Gloucester County have full time police departments which are well equipped with two

way radio communications. Each municipality has one or more fire departments, rescue squads and ambulance squads, all equipped with two way radio communications of one or more channel capabilities. Fire, rescue and ambulance squads are dispatched by the recently established County Communications Center in Clayton. Most of the larger units of local government as well as the county have mobile radio equipment in their Public Works units. So, all the above considered, it seems likely that most types of emergency situations can be handled by the regularly established networks.

However there is always that one unlikely emergency situation that has a way of popping up at the most unexpected time, i.e., ice storm, severe weather, blizzard, tornado and etc. That is when the Amateur Radio Emergency Service would be called into action, when all the regular channels are inoperable or overburdened. In my fourteen years as Emergency Coordinator, I cannot recall any time when we have been called into service in the wake of a disaster.

The A.R.E.S. has helped in the search for a missing child, and yearly provides communications for several worthwhile civic endeavors; that is walk-a-thons, bike-a-thons, parades, Boy Scout exhibits and etc.

In our county the A.R.E.S. is also the working nucleus of R.A.C.E.S. This gives us more flexability in R.A.C.E.S. operations and at the same time gives the A.R.E.S. more clout and a Emergency Operating Center to use at our discretion, for routine drills as well as for county government functions.

Our A.R.E.S. group is affiliated with NOAA Weather Radio's Skywarn, and the county chapter of the American Red Cross, as well as being the Official Emergency Communication backup system for county government.

We are indeed fortunate to have at our disposal the use of the Gloucester County Amateur Radio Clubs repeater systems, probably the finest repeater systems in S.N.J.

In an Emergency situation all A.R.E.S.members, numbering about fifty, are instructed to monitor the Pitman repeater 147.78/.18 MHz. The E.C., Assistant E.C.'s or any responsible net member would activate the net. Those members so equipped would be instructed to monitor the 220 MHz. repeater. (In the future we expect to also use the new 440 MHz. repeater.)

We would most likely open the Emergency operating Center, in the Court House in Woodbury, to take advantage of the emergency power and H.F. equipment at the E.O.C.

The operator(s) at the E.O.C. would monitor 147.78/.18, 223.06/.66 MHz. repeaters, the State O.E.M. frequencies at 3.990.5 MHz., 145.68 s., and the 146.295/.895 MHz. Camden County repeater.

In the event of a large scale power outage, we can still maintain open channels of communications using mobile and hand held V.H.F. radio equipment. If we lose the repeaters we would go to simplex operations on 147.540 and 223.780 MHz. plus any number of other channels that are always available for our use.

Our equipment flexability would allow us to interface with other counties in S.N.J. on their frequencies and also maintain contact with N.T.S. nets on 2.950 and 146.055/.655 MHz.

Here's a hint to help determine the CQ zone of some of the Asiatic Russian call areas.

- Zone 17 includes UA or UK9's with suffexes begining with A,C,F,G,J,K,L,Q,S,X.
- Zone 18 includes UA9's H,I,O,P,U,V,W,Y,Z and UA or UKØ's with A,B,H,O,S,T,U,V,W
- Zone 19 includes only UA or UKØ's with C,E,F,G,I,J,K,L,M,Q,R,Z as the first letter of the suffex of their callsign.

The CQ worked all Zone (WAZ) award is a very attractive award available for working all 40 zones. A complete list of the zones can be found in many Radio publications.

SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

HAM LOSES LICENSE FOR CHEATING ON TEST

FCC Acting Chief Administrative Law Judge Thomas B. Fitzpatrick has ordered the Technician class license of Vicent J. Beard suspended for term, his N2EDW station license revoked and his application for a General class operator license denied after FCC determined that Beard had cheated on a General class code test. On March 23, 1983, Beard appeared at the New York City office to take the Extra and General class code tests. Testimony indicated that after failing the Extra class code test, Beard was called back into the examination room by FCC Examiner Debra Thomas for the General class level exam. After playing the 13 wpm tape, Thomas handed all applicants the questions and answer sheets. She then observed Beard "looking into his left hand which was cupped and down on the writing surface." She confronted him and found that he had a small card in his hand which contained the answers for all 11 versions of the 13 wpm tape "was covered with writing but does not show any coherent message on either side."

Beard acknowledged that he had the card in his hand during the exam, but indicated that he had not intended to cheat. He said that while waiting to take the 13 wpm test he had made the acquaintance of another ham named "Bruce" in the waiting room. Beard said that as he got up to enter the examination room, Bruce handed him the card. He only looked at the card after the 13 wpm tape had been completed and then realized what it was. At this point, according to Beard's own testimony, Thomas asked to see what he had in his hand. Thomas terminated the exam and informed Beard that he had failed. He waited 30 days and retested in late April. This time he passed the 13 wpm code test.

Beard was not able to recall a call sign or last name for "Bruce." No one with the first or last name of "Bruce" or with a middle initial "B" took any amateur or other operator exam in the office on March 23, 1983.

Judge Fitzpatrick concluded that "Beard not only acknowledged that he had the card in his hand but that his actions were of a 'suspicious nature' in that he was looking into his hand at the card when Application Examiner Thomas terminated his examination. Beard's explanation that he was given the card by a stranger called 'Bruce' as he entered the examination room and that he was merely looking at the card to determine what it was after he realized that he couldn't pass the examination is rejected as inherently improbable." Beard has until June 6 to appeal this decision.

Johnson, WA2JHU, of Syracuse, New York, was caught violating 97.84 (failure to identify) and 97.113 (broadcasting). But there is an interesting angle to this story. Captain David A. Stevenson, of the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department, received complaints from hams supplying communications at the 1983 Empire State Games in Syracuse that they were being severely interfered with. Stevenson tracked down the culprit electronically, and turned the information over to Federal officials. Jammers beware! (FCC release #3776, 4/23/84)

NEW AMATEUR RADIO TESTS ISSUED (TNX to W5YI Report es K2JF)

The FCC has <u>re-issued the Novice</u> Amateur Radio Operator License (Element 2) examination to coincide with recent changes in Part 97 Rules. The new Novice Test question edition is dated February 1984 and replaces the July 1983 version.

In addition, the Commission has released the <u>Advanced</u> (Element 4A) and <u>Amateur Extra Class</u> (Element 4B) test questions. These were supposed to have been ready in time for theDayton HamVention, but were still at the printers when <u>Johnny Johnston</u> (W3BE), FCC Personal Radio Branch Chief came to Dayton. He mailed them to me as soon as he returned to Washington.

Since all question lists have now been developed, the new volunteer examination program can now proceed in its entirety. Up until now, only Technician and General Class examinations could be given under the new (Tec and up) VE program. The Technician Class through Amateur Extra volunteer ham exam program is completely different from that of the Novice.

FCC SOLICITS NEW HAM EXAM QUESTIONS

The Commission also said they invited amateur radio operators to submit questions for future Amateur Radio license examination revisions. Such questions must be suitable for various types of answer formats: single answer, multiple choice or essay type. All proposed questions must be directed to the <u>Personal Radio Branch</u>, FCC, Washington, DC 20554.

Each proposed question must be submitted on a single $8\text{-}\frac{1}{2}\text{"}$ x ll" sheet of paper showing the following:

- (1) The test element (2,3,4A or 4B) for which the question is proposed.
- (2) The study guide topic upon which the question is based (Example: Element 3B(2) Radio Teleprinting Operating Procedures.)
- (3) The question and the answer.
- (4) One or more reference sources which confirm the correct answer. (Examples: FCC Rule number; textbook name and page number.)
- (5) Submittor's name, address, operator class and amateur radio station call sign.
