Don't forget the sunscreen!



NEW JERSEY CALLSIGN PLATES...

For Motorcycles?!?

On April 7, 1993, the New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles, Special Plates Unit(SPU), reversed a policy of not issuing amateur callsign license plates for motor cycles. The first set of plates issued were received three weeks later by G.C.A.R.C.'s own Fred Munzenmayer, KB2BF!!!

This resulted from lengthy efforts by Fred for the SPU to review their policy in interpreting the statute:

39:3-27.5 Amateur Radio Call Signs on Registration Plates

The director of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall cause to be issued to applicants who hold amateur radio licenses issued by the Federal Communications Commission, registration plates for motor vehicles bearing the amateur radio call letters of the respective applicants. Where such call letters consist of less than six letters, the director, upon request, shall cause to be issued duplicate plates, with such marks as the director may deem to be appropriate to distinguish them from the original plates, for any additional motor vehicles which an applicant may register.

The definition of "motor vehicle" in Motor Vehicle and Traffic Laws of New Jersey, Title 39 of the Revised Statutes plus related statutes, 1993, is:

"Motor vehicle" includes all vehicles propelled otherwise than by muscular power, excepting such vehicles as run only upon rails or tracks and motorized bicycles.

Previously, the stated policy was that this did not apply to motorcycles. Apparently this information has been given as long as call letter plates have been issued.

There is a limit of 5 letters that can fir on a motorcycles plate due to size. If you have a 5 letter call and a set of call letter plates on your car, you must change the car to conventional plates (a good time is renewal) and apply as follows:

Cycle: XX2XX Car..: XX2XX -2

If you have a 4 letter call, the cycle can be X2XX -2 or XX2X -2.

The vehicle must be registered to the holder of the amateur call (not a spouse) and a copy of the valid amateur license is required. There is a one time fee of \$10 in addition to the normal registration fee, but subsequent renewals are at the normal rate. Contact the Special Plates Unit and request amateur license plate forms (one for each vehicle) at (609)292-0800. The phone is usually very busy and mornings are best to get through or try the mail. Rose Bartolini is the supervisor and should be helpful if the person you get is not familiar with this information.

The new Public Law 102-561 substantially revises all criminal provisions involving copyright infringement, including that of computer software. If you think you are not a criminal, you may be surprised by the new statute!

No one is sure whether all computer owners in the US may eventually be found to be felons, but it is hoped the law will be used to suppress only large-scale pirates. You may have already seen ads offering rewards for turning in friends and neighbors who could fall under the statute's broad provisions.

A FELONY, punishable by 5 years/\$250,000 to illegally reproduce or distribute for gain or advantage during any 6-month period:

- * Ten or more copies, or one copy of ten or more works, or any combination, of copyrighted works,
- * Whose retail value exceeds \$2500,
- * When the reproduction is "willful."

Those of you who have made fewer copies than are worth \$2500, take no solace in that. You may still not be safe. Section b(3) says that although you may not be a felon nor imprisoned for more than year, you could still serve up to a year and be fined \$250,000!

Where in the Cycle Are We?


WE ARE FREQUENTLY asked for the "Big Picture", that is, our position in the current solar cycle. Here is a quick look at where we are.

We are at month 77 of Solar Cycle 22 and in the declining phase of this cycle. Sunspot maximum was in July 1989: the smoothed sunspot number was 158.5. The 10.7-cm flux maximum was 213.1 in June 1989, but it peaked again at 207.7 in July 1991. We abruptly left maximum in early 1992.

We're in declining part of the cycle where the chance of major flares is less, but coronal holes are more common, which results in more recurrent geomagnetic activity (more about this later).

All indicators suggest that sunspot minimum will be in 1996. Cycle 23 is expected to be a larger cycle than the average, and to be somewhat shorter than average, last roughly 10 years.

You hear that report about cellular phones causing cancer? Well, I just got rid of mine!



SUPER EASY GROUND ROD

The main purpose of equipment, system grounding is to insure that all masts, towers, enclosures, cabinets, ect. are at ground potential. This reduces the Possibility of electrical shock to personnel coming into contact with metal parts of the system.

The secondary function of this grounding is to improve the operation and service of the system configuration. Faulty ground returns are detrimental to these functions and can result in intermodulation effects and noise/voltage buildup with there associated false signals, signal distortion and service interruptions.

Considering the characteristics of the soil in South Jersey, I have found the following ground rod to be effective as well as inexpensive and easy to install. I came up with the idea when I saw the Landscapers run a PVC pipe for my lawn sprinklers under my driveway.

The size of the available hose determines the size of the pipe or vice versa. Procure a ten foot length of copper water pipe (1/2" or 5/8") and two end caps, (cost about 5 or 6 dollars) connect your garden hose to one end and secure with a small hose clamp, make a small starter hole about 6" deep with a trowel or whatever, turn the water on let it do the work, insert the open end of the pipe into the starter hole, the water will move the dirt out of the way and the pipe should go in easily. I was able to sink mine about 8ft in 4 min. At that point the earth was grabbing the pipe too tightly to proceed further. I disconnected the hose, placed an end cap on the pipe and used a rubber mallet to drive it the last 1 1/2ft.. If you decide to trim the pipe after you reach the desired depth you may need the second end cap, (the first one, if you used something other then a rubber mallet won't come off).

Use heavy ground wire (braided), or at least 1/4" copper tubing to connect the ground rod to the mast or tower. Above all remember "Ground IS NOT Ground the world around" and all your equipment should be connected to a single ground source.

NOVICE EXAMS BY VECS

The FCC has placed Novice Class examinations under the Volunteer Examiner Coordinator program. As with other class amateur license exams, responsibility for both preparation and administration of Novice exams will lie with the VEC system, in the interest of integrity, simplification and efficiency, the FCC said today.

The commission also will allow recovery of out-OF-POCKET costs for coordinating and administering Novice examinations.

The examination elements required for the Novice license are already being administered in the VEC system because they are also requirements for other classes of amateur operator licenses.

The FCC said that placing Novice examinations under the VEC system would avoid confusion caused by having two different systems result in fewer errors in exam administration and in paperwork (including allowing simplification of the FCC Form 610) and improve the availability of overall data on examinations.

This action, in PR Docket 92-154, was taken May 3. No effective date for implementation was announced. NNNN

QST de W1AW ARRL Bulletin 59 ARLB059 From ARRL Headquarters Newington CT May 21, 1993 To all radio amateurs

A joint resolution of congress to recognize the achievements of radio amateurs, and to establish support for radio amateurs as national policy, was introduced in the house on May 20 as H. J. RES.199. It is identical to S. J. RES. 90, introduced in the Senate on May 7.

House sponsors of the measure are Representatives Mike Kreidler of Washington and Jim Cooper of Tennessee. They have been joined by 15 additional co-sponsors.

QST de W1AW ARRL Bulletin 58 ARLB058 From ARRL Headquarters Newington CT May 21, 1993 To all radio amateurs

FCC FINES ARE FINE

A federal court judge in Washington, DC, has found for the Federal Communications Commission in a lawsuit in which the ARRL supported the FCC.

The suit, brought by Action For Children's Television and 20 other broadcasting and public-interest organizations, challenged the FCC's monetary forfeiture procedures in indecency cases. The League's interest in the matter, the ARRL said in a Friend-Of-The-Court brief, was to protect the interests of radio amateurs in effective FCC enforcement.

On May 18, U.S. District Judge Royce C. Lamberth granted an FCC motion to dismiss the plaintiffs' request that all indecency forfeiture proceedings currently before the FCC be dismissed as well as a commission motion to dismiss the major complainants in the lawsuit for "lack of standing."

In addition, Judge Lamberth granted the FCC's motion to dismiss the two other major points sought by the plaintiffs:

- 1. To find that the review procedures now used by the FCC cannot constitutionally be used to adjudicate alleged indecency violations under federal law and
- 2. To enjoin the FCC from initiating or conducting forfeiture proceedings for alleged violations of federal law concerning indecency.

The court did deny the FCC's motion to dismiss a constitutional claim by Infininity Broadcasting Corp. arising from a 1990 Notice Of Apparent Liability.

The entire case was ordered dismissed.

US AMATEUR POWER LIMITS

At all times, transmitter power should be kept down to that necessory to corry out the desired communications. Power is rated in watta PEP output. Unless otherwise stated, the maximum power output Is 1500 W. Power for all Ilcense classes is limited to 200 W in the 10,100-10,150 kHz band and in all Navice subbands below 28,100 kHz. Novices and Technicians are restricted to 200 W in the 28,100-28,500 kHz subbands. In addition, Novices are restricted to 25 W in the 222.1-223.91 MHz subbond and 5 W in the 1270-1295 MHz subband.

Operators with Technicion class licenses and above may operate on all bands above 50 MHz. For more detailed information see the FCC Rule Book.

Constitutional Ammendment Nr.: 1993-01 Dated: April 23, 1993

Purpose:

- · Clarification of the process required for changes to the Constitution of the G.C.A.R.C.
- · Addition of a 'Constitution Committee' as one of the standing committees.

Scope:

Affects amendments, alterations or abrogations to the Constitution which are currently covered in Article IX. Affects also, the standing committees which are defined in Article II, Section 2.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE G.C.A.R.C. CONSTITUTION

Date: April 04, 1993 Amendment: 1993-01

The following amendments to the GCARC Constitution, dated October 4, 1989, is submitted for approval.

Part 1:

Article IX - Amendments

This article shall be abrogated in it's entirety, and the following entered in it's place.

Article IX - Constitutional Amendments, Alterations & Abrogations

Section 1: Amendments, alterations and abrogations to the GCARC Constitution shall be presented for approval at two successive General Membership meetings once the following criteria has been met in the order presented:

- 1: The originator of the proposal shall present it in written form to the Chairperson of the Constitution Committee.
- 2: The GCARC Constitution Committee shall write the proposed change to the Constitution insuring that:
 - a: it meets the desires of the originator.
 - b: it does not violate any other areas of the Constitution or Bylaws.
 - c: the finished proposal is in proper format for presentation.
- 3: Each proposal submitted to the committee shall be assigned a sequential number which will be made up of the year followed by a dash and a number beginning with 01 for each year. (i.e. 1993-01)
- 4: The proposal shall than be returned to the originator who is responsible for obtaining the 15 signatures required. The originator has 60 days to obtain the required 15 signatures beginning the day the proposed amendment is returned to the originator by the Constitution Committee,
- 5: Once the originator has obtained the 15 signatures from full members in good standing, the proposed amendment is it be returned to the Constitution Committee, or one of the elected CLUB officials who will insure that it is distributed to the membership as required below.

Section 2: Each member of the GCARC in good standing shall receive a written copy of the proposal, once the 15 signatures have been collected and <u>before</u> the first reading at a General Membership meeting. This notification shall be made in either a separate mailing by the recording secretary or in the monthly publication of the CLUB (Crosstalk).

Section 3: The reading of the proposal shall be made at two successive General Membership meetings by a member of the Constitution Committee, or in their absence, by one of the elected officials of the CLUB.

Section 4: The general membership shall vote on the amendment immediately after the second reading at the General Membership meeting. The proposal shall be adopted if seventy-five percent (75%) of the votes cast are in favor of such action. Votes shall be taken by either a show of hands or secret ballot. Votes shall indicate for, against or abstaining.

Section 5: If the amendment is approved by the membership, it will take effect immediately.

Article II, Section 2, shall be amended by the addition of a Constitution Committee as one of the standing committees...
