

<u>'D Day' Celebrations</u>... Special event stations TM6JUN and F6REF will be active during the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the landing of the Allied Forces at Normandy.

P4 ARUBA... Art K9XJ will be active as F4/K9XJ and P40XJ June 18-23. QSL via K9XJ's CB address with an SASE.

GU GUERNSEY... GU/DL6ET and GU/DL9YAJ will be active from Guernsey June 1-12. Active on all bands on CW and SSB & RTTY.

JY JORDAN... A group of operatorswill be active from Jordan until Jun 27. Primarily on 6 meters, but with some HF activity. Look for JY8JH, JY8OX, JY8ZC, JY8IC, JY8VA & JY8ED. OSL their home address

TT8 CHAD... F50IJ/TT8 will soon be signing TT8PS. He is expected to be active for 3-4 months. Activity should be on all HF bands CW and SSB.

FP ST. PIERRE et MIQUELON... VE9AA and others will be active during the first week of June on 6 meters and some HF activity.

VE8 ELLESMERE ISLAND... Martin G3USF, VE8RAF will be active from Ellesmere Is. through Augus 12. Freqs .3515, 7015, 10112, 14005, 18070, 21055, 14142, 14290, & 21290 kHz. CW will be the preferred mode. There will also will be stations on 6 and 10 meters beacons active on alternating days. 50018 or 50005 khz on even dates 28192.5 & 28197.5.

SSB NET OPERATIONS... 14226.5 (11,22Z) and 14247 (2100Z). There have been some very good DX check-in recently. If you want further information on these nets and others contact the writer K2JF.

REPEATER PROCEDURES

(Or, how NOT to be offensive on the repeater)

As new or recently upgraded hams come onto the various repeaters, the question of repeater operating procedures always arises. New operators always wonder if they're "doing it right", while more experienced operators get annoyed at the new folks, forgetting that they, too were once in that same position. Here are a few rules for repeater operation. Following them will make use of the repeater more pleasant for all...

- Remember that many repeaters, including GCARC's 147.18/78, have a key-up delay. In other words, a signal must be detected for a period of time (1.25 seconds on '18') before the repeater will start to transmit. This prevents spurious signals from accidentally bringing up the machine, but also means that if you don't wait after hitting your transmit button, much of your call will be lost. ("N2SRQ" becomes "SRQ")
- To start a conversation, just give the call of the station with whom you wish to speak, followed by your own, such as "N2GVR this is N2SRQ". Longer calls and "Steve are you there?" are unnecessary. It is not necessary to later announce "nothing heard." Everyone already knows that, since they didn't here anything either.
- When in a QSO, always specify who is next to speak. Otherwise either nobody will start to speak or several will at once, creating a lot of confusion. It is as simple as saying, "Charlie to take it, this is N2GVR".
- To join an ongoing QSO, just wait for a pause in the conversation and drop in your call. The next station will recognize you, and turn the repeater over to you, or finish his/her comment and then do so. On most repeaters the word "break" usually is reserved for EMERGENCIES, when the breaker needs to make a quick call. This may vary from machine to machine. A triple break "BREAK BREAK BREAK" is universally recognized as an emergency break-in. Always turn the repeater over to the breaker IMMEDIATELY when you hear it.

Consider also the difference between "joining a conversation" and "barging in." Just as in person, it is impolite to interrupt a conversation until it is finished, unless your "traffic" is of such importance that it can't wait or relevant to what is being said.

 ALWAYS wait for a courtesy tone when someone else has finished transmitting, and it is your turn to talk. This prevents the repeater from 'timing out" and also allows someone else to interrupt or join the conversation if needed. Some repeaters do not have a courtesy tone, and a short pause is all that is required.

- It is NOT necessary to identify after every transmission! FCC rules state that you must ID every ten minutes(and you never have to use the other station's call letter unless you're handling third party traffic). By sticking to this timing, or a little more often, your conversations go a little more smoothly, while still allowing casual listeners to hear who is using the repeater.
- Remember that there are potentially many listeners to a repeater conversation. This means you should be cautious about giving phone numbers over the air, and don't mention when people will be away on vacation, and try to avoid negative or personal comments. Try to present the best possible appearance for ham radio to anyone who may be listening on a scanner.
- Don't be long winded. If you speak to someone face to face you don't talk two minutes and wait for him to talk two minutes. VHF FM is a great conversational mode; treat it much the same way you would a telephone.
- The primary use of repeaters is to serve in emergencies. If someone calls needing assistance and you can place a call for them, please do so. Keep a list of appropriate emergency phone numbers where you can access it quickly. Conversely, if someone has already answered the emergency call, DO NOT interrupt unless you are absolutely sure you can add to the situation. More confusion is created by people anxious to help when they are not needed.


