Concurrent with the October 26 shift to standard time throughout the country, WIAW will resume its Fall Winter Schedule. November QST will note expanded WIAW operating time as well as the first morning qualifying run scheduled for December 10. Your editor just returned from a trip to Terre Haute, Indiana, where I spent two weeks visitng my son who had just been transfered there from Pitman, N.J., he being the General Manager of Order Service, Taping, and Warehousing for the Columbia Record Company. Needless to say, he took us on a tour of the plant out there which happens to be four times the size of Pitman's plant. The business has gotten so big that the company has to lease buildings all over town and still needs more room. A large building is in the process of being built for tapes alone. I visited the Tape Department and saw the master tape running and feeding 12 slave units transcribing at once. Of course, they had several masters running at the same time. The head production man told me that they were making 60,000 tapes per week. The quality control could only process 50,000 tapes per, making a backlog, hence the expansion. Their prediction is that tapes will take the place of records in sales within two years. Their masters are rack and panel jobs about seven feet high and are solid state. The slave units are about four feet high and four feet square with the spools on top and they record as high as six channels at the same time on all slave units. When the master has recorded the time run of the tapes, a tone signal is given and the tapes are cut off at this point, which when packaged, will hake up the tapes that you purchase in your local stores. I cannot begin to tell you of all the interesting things that I saw at the plant. out there and back through West Virginia, we made 1,820 miles and saw only

two Quad antennas, one Wr, one K8, and one WA9 license plate. Of all the QRM on the bands, you would think that all of the hams in the U.S. lived in the Middle West, but I failed to see a display of them.

Wednesday was the day a man set aside for worrying. Came the temptation to worry any other day, he noted the concern, but put it away for Wednesday. When Wednesday came, he seldom could recall WHY the items had worried him originally, or he found that they had already been taken care of.

An impractical man? Hardly! He retired sometime ago from the Chairmanship of the Board of a large company, -happy, healthy, and successful.

ABOUT QSLING.....

When I first broke into ham radio a number of years ago, one of the highlights of Hamming was to receive a QSL from the station you talked to whether it was a DX station or just a contact in the State next to you. It was the pride or trademark of each ham's station, and a great deal of time was put into the design or composition of the card to make it different from the other fellows. What happens now?...Well, when you work a good DX station and ask for a QSL for verification, you not only have to send him yours first, but also a self-addressed envelope with a couple of international reply coupons plus waiting a month or so before you get yours...if you do. Sort of makes you feel that he is doing you an extreme favor in sending you his, but on the other side of the coin, he does not consider that you are doing him one in sending yours. Of course, he can tell you that he will QSL through the bureau and then you wait another 8 or 10 months before you receive it.

Another gripe is about these DX stations asking for your QSL, and then you whistle for theirs. From my experience, one of the worse countries for this practice is Italy, then France, followed closely by South American Stations. It costs as much for us to send them a card as it does for them to send us one; yet they still expect us to pay double to get one of their cards.

Some relief in the problem is when they tell you that they have a QSL manager in the States who will send you a card if you contact Thm. This is not always so because last week I received two QSL's, one from a W7 in Washington, and one from a K7 in Montana, asking for a QSL card from a station they worked in Cammeron. I returned their QSL's and told them evidently the station was a phoney, as I never was and have never been been a QSL manager.

If you do get a legit manager here, he has to wait until he receives the confirmation from the DX station which sometimes takes a month or so. Then also, the quality of the QSL's do not seem the same as to beauty or individuality. Too many hams are using stock cards for their QSLs. Now, how can this kind of a card make your contact a standout when there are a thousand other stations using the same design? It just can't be done!

Personally, I feel that not enough emphasis is put on this phase of hamming when the new member joins the ranks. We have become so careless in our indoctrination that we tend to overlook traditions, and rob the new ham of all the fun and pleasure that is truly a part of Ham Radio. We old timers have ourselves to blame because we have been through the mill and should instill our knowledge into the new Ham.

If we check up further, we will find that the Ham of today is fast becoming a mail order catalogue creature who in a couple of years will make the cld timer extinct. We just can't let what HAM RADIO means to the pioneers be set aside and dwindle into oblivion.

Tokyo.... Use of the Hall effect for a brushless dc motor has been announced by Pioneer Electronics Corp. for portable and car tape recorders. The motors which do not need commutators or brushes, reportedly provide noise-free operation with very low rumble, wow and flutter. With the Hall effect, a voltage is developed across a conductive material when it is placed in a vertical magnetic field. Pioneer uses IC's in conjunction with the Hall device to electronically operate the motor.
