Although GCARC is not a "contest" Club, we have some prolific contest operators whose achievements should not go unnoticed; so congratulations to:

whose points captured the SNJ section in the 1981 ARRL N2SS: DX phone contest.

whose points captured SNJ in the ARRL DX CW contest. W2YC: N2BCF & K2NVT: whose QRP Field Day excursion was reported in CQ's September Issue.

whose ARRL DX contest efforts were good enough to capture AA2Z: 8th place overall for the U.S. + Canada and top CW + SSB score for Murphy's Marauders, Mark's Contest Club!

whose 1981 multi-operator CQ WW Phone Contest effort captured 10th place in the U.S.

Again, congratulations to all for a job well done!
October also marked the beginning of a new "Megapoint" contest season. CQ's World Wide Phone Contest is October 30-31 (and may be hsitory by the time you read this). Last year's contest saw these calls active - EK2, KG6, OY5, EA8, CEØ, CX5, KX6, FO8, JX5, SV9, A9X, J28, 6W8, 3S6, 9Q5 and many, many more. Jump in and tackle this DX smorgasborg. But watch out it could be habit forming!

November's events are exciting. The ARRL Sweepstakes weekends are Nov. 6-7 (CW) and Nov. 20-21 (SSB), while the CQ WW DX Phone CW portion is Nov. 27-28.

There are strong rumors of a GCARC multi-operator sweepstakes CW effort from Wayne Wilson's shore cabin. At this writing potential operators included WA2LET (of course), W2YC, N2CQ, WA2NPD, K2HPV, and yours truly. Any club members who would like to experience contest operation are welcome aboard. See WA2LET if you would like to join this "illustrious" crew "in the trenches". In addition, Wayne is willing to make a "go" of the SSB Contest if the interest is there, again call WA2LET for details.

All of the events mentioned above are Megapoint contest events. Remember, any member who accumulates 1,000,000 or more Megapoint contest "points" qualifies for the award. Endorsements are issued for each additional 1,000,000 points. The initial award is mounted on a handsome plaque which makes a nice addition to the shack. Megapoints are credited based on a multiplier (whose value varies by contest)

which is applied to your actual contest scores. For example, CW WW scores are multiplied by 5 to get their equivalent Megapoint value. Points can accumulate quickly, so a little operating goes a long way:

Sweepstakes is also one of the few contests where modest stations can be competitive. Dipoles are common since 40 meters is the work-horse band and the low power (under 200 watts) categories prompt many ops to go barefoot.

If you're new to contesting contest QRM, etc. can be intimidating. Try going "up" the band and working at the edge of the contest frequencies. (QRM and/or code speeds are usually much lower). Then move down as you feel more comfortable. Also, remember it's no sin not to work the entire contest, jump in & bang out a few QSO's, it's fun and it will help the club. Only 8,000 points separated us from the next club in last year's ARRL DX effort so your log does count!

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DX Dope, Tnx to SNEDXA and to KE2M

Zone 13. For those working on 5 band WAZ, look for VP8ANT, Zone 13, on 80 and 40 Meter CW and for CE6EAT on 80 Meter CW.
Mongolia. JTlAN is trying very hard to work the USA on 3645 KHz,

listening on 3798 KHz at 1000z, SSB only.

Russian Oblast. UKØlAA/UØT is a very rare Russian Oblast, Ust Orda Buriat, in region number 174. It is very active on 14 MHz CW and also some SSB. It is not known how long this station will be on the air.

Vanuatu. Look for YJ8RG 1000 to 13002 on 3797 KHz SSB. Also check around 1900 to 19302.

Saudi Arabia. HZlAB, operated by WA8MOA, keeps a regular watch on 1827 KHz at European sunset and at his sunrise for North America. Bob has recently been copies in North America with 559 signals. Tonga. A35TN is recently active on 14202 KHz after 1000Z. Lord Howe. AX3DHT/LH has arrived on Lord Howe Island for an extended all band operation. He intends to remain on Lord Howe through November 1.

Madagascar. Alain, 5R8AL, frequently appears for a sked Mondays at 1800Z on 21332 KHz.

Zone 2. VE2HQ, VE2FU and VE2EZU will operate as VE2HQ/2 in Zone 2 during both weeks of the CQ Worldwide DX contest.

DXCC Country Deletions. The ARRL Awards Committee has accepted the recommendations of the DX advisory committee to delete Serrana Bank, Roncador Cay, KP3, KS4, HKØ, Bajo Nuevo, HKØ, and the Saudi Arabia/ Iraq neutral zone, 8Z4, from the current DXCC list by virtue of their undergoing a significant change in administration, thus no longer meeting any criteria for separate country status. These deletions become effective December 1, 1982. Future operations from the Serrana Bank, Roncador Cay and Bajo Nuevo areas will count the same as San Andres and Providentia Islands for DXCC credit. The Saudi Arabia/Iraq neutral zone no longer exists as a separate entity. This brings the current country total to 315, with 52 deletions. Solomon Islands. H44BS can be found Sundays at 2300Z on 28600 KHz. Iraq. YIIBGD, operator Kamal, looks for U.S. QSOS on Saturdays after 1500Z on 14250 KHz with a German MC.

Bouvet. DK9KD says that the plans for operation this winter have been shelved for this year.

Heard Island. KP2A reports that plans continue with no problems for the planned January trip under sponsorship of IDXF, NCDXF and WIA.

FCC Proposes New Ham Power Limit Specs

The FCC has issued a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (FCC #82-410) seeking to establish a new maximum transmitting power measurement guideline for the Amateur Radio Service. The Commission wants to replace the present input power system which the Commission said was "archaic and unsuitable." The proposed rule change principally involves a new definition of transmitting power in terms of peak envelope power (PEP) output to replace "definitions, limits and measuring procedures developed for the amateur radio technology of the 1920s." Output peak envelope power (PEP) is a measure of output power at a point in the radio frequency cycle that envelops the entire signal being transmitted. The FCC said "PEP measurements can be clearly applied to virtually all emission types and can be easily computed from carrier power for many popular emission modes.

The Commission has tried several times earlier to change or redefine amateur power limits without success. The previous attempts were not implemented since they were tied to other proposed (and unsuccessful) rulemaking.

But the FCC again made it clear that the present rules governing power limitations for the Amateur Services were antiquated and referred to "obsolete vacuum tube technology" which "have no clear meaning" for solid state transmitters and amplifiers now in common use." The FCC went as far as to say that for much of the equipment now in use, "the rules require a complex and often dangerous disassembly procedure to measure input power." Measurement of input power and transmitter power, as required by present rules, "is difficult and impractical in the single sideband mode and with other modern and innovative modulation techniques," the Commission said. In late September, the FCC Commissioners issued still another amateur power limit NPRM. This time it was not linked to any other subject.

The new proposal limits amateurs operating on Novice frequencies to 200 watts PEP output. All other amateurs would be limited to 1,500 watts PEP output, except for operation in areas or on frequencies protecting military zones where a 50-watt PEP limit would apply. (This applies generally to the 420-450 MHz ham band.) The 1,500 watt PEP output limitation was proposed since this would not require a reduction in power most operators currently use. The Commission asked the amateur community to give their views on these power limits. The new proposed rules do not require the necessity of accurately measureing input power as currently required "since other means of determining compliance with power limits are available."

Among other advantages of the proposed change, definition of power in terms of PEP output would enable amateurs to transmit at the same minimum power across all bands. Power would not have to be limited by the decline in amplifier efficiency at the higher frequencies, and an operator would not have to operate at the upper margin of amplifier capability to maintain power at higher frequencies.

The proposal also would revise the present multi-meaning definition of effective radiated power (ERP), basing it on transmitter power delivered to the antenna, as measured in PEP terms. The FCC said the change should have no effect on most amateur repeater operations.

For the one emission mode which would be significantly reduced

in authorized power -- double sideband AM (amplitude modulation) -- the Commission proposed to provide a five-year "grandfather" period during which amateurs could continue to use the old definitions, limits and measurement procedures. After the five-year period they could still use that mode, but at reduced power. The Commission specifically asked for comments on the grandfather period for double sideband AM emissions. This mode is now rarely used by the ham community. It also asked for comments on impedance matching during station inspections by FCC engineers and on whether there should be an exception to the PEP output definition for pulse transmissions. Deadlines to file comments will be announced shortly. (Unanimous action by FCC Commissioners by NPRM in PR Docket #82-624.)

Amateur License of Hollywood, California Ham Operator Revoked David Hildebrand, (N6BHU) Hollywood, Cal., has had him ham ticket pulled by FCC Law Judge, Joseph P. Gonzalez. The case against Hildebrand was initiated in March, 1981, after the FCC's Private Radio Bureau issued an order directing Hildebrand to show cause why his N6BHU station license should not be revoked and his operator's license suspended "for violation of FCC rules prohibiting transmission of communications containing obscene, indecent or profane language."

Although Hildebrand admitted to engaging in the prohibited communications, he argued that "the Commission did not show that the words used during his transmissions were patently offensive to listeners in the Los Angeles area." Additionally, Hildebrand contended that "such language has been used for many years by amateur operators in that area without objections from the FCC."

However, in an initial decision issued September 24th, Judge Gonzalez concluded that Section 97.119 of the rules "explicitly authorizes the Commission to impose sanctions on licensees who willfully engage in offensive broadcasting." Judge Gonzalez found the language used by Hildebrand "to be obscene and offensive", noting that "a large audience could have been exposed to these transmissions, including individuals under 17 years of age." The decision is one of the very first...if not the first...decision involving obscenity without having other violations associated with it. As a general rule, the FCC has opted not to get involved in censorship - or what is or is not acceptable language.

WARC TREATY REPORTED OUT OF SENATE FOREIGN RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The much publicized World Administrative Radio Conference (WARC)
which concluded in 1979 is now well on its way toward ratification by
the United States Senate. The WARC accord (Treaty 97-21) has been
considered and approved "as written" by the Senate Committee on Foreign
Relations. The Committee could have recommended that the WARC document
be accepted in part...or with additional conditions or "reservations"
and this was indeed considered. The U.S. took a record six reservations during the international conference. A reservation offers
escape from disagreeable decisions of the majority.
