PROPOSED CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION

The following amendment to the Club Constitution was presented to the Club at the October general meeting and read for the first of three times as required. The amendment is required to fund the 1984 budget as propose by the budget committee and approved by the club membership at the October meeting. The amendment will be read at the November and December meetings followed by a vote on the amandment at the December meeting.

Proposed change to the constitution of The Gloucester County Amateur Radio Club, Inc.

Proposed by the Board of Directors on October 5, 1983 to permit adoption of the new 1984 budget.

Article VII - Dues

Section 1. The annual dues for full membership shall be Fifteen Dollars ($\$15.\emptyset\emptyset$) if paid on or before March 31st each year. If paid after March 31st the rate shall be twenty Dollars ($\$20.\emptyset\emptyset$). Additional family members of a full member may have full membership at the rate of Seven Dollars Fifty Cents ($\$7.5\emptyset$); these members will not receive their own copy of "Crosstalk". The initiation fee, payable by members upon election to or reinstatement of full membership, shall be Three Dollars ($\$3.\emptyset\emptyset$). Honorary members shall be exempt from paying any dues or fees.

Section 2. The annual dues for associate membership shall be Ten Dollars (\$10.00) if paid on or before March 31st each year. If paid after March 31 the rate shall be Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00). The initiation fee for associate member shall be One Dollar (\$1.00). At any time during , etc.

GCARC SPARKS JOTA!

A new - kid - on - the block appeared at the annual Southern N.J. Boy Scout Council Camporee held on the weekend of October 15th at Camp The "New Kid" was none other than the GCARC - complete with field stations on 2, 15, and 20 meters and assorted display items and hand outs. The purpose was to permit the Scouts to participate in the 25th Anniversary year of JOTA, Jamboree on the Air, and international event where scouts, via Ham Radio, can talk to each other from far-away places and make friends over the air. Radio Clubs and individuals assist the Scouts in doing this worldwide and, at the same time, Scouts are introduced to the world of Amateur Radio. Some 300 Scouts visited the GCARC stations (in groups of 25 - every 30 minutes) all day Saturday and many, were bold enough to talk over-the-air: SSB QSO's were held with a host of other Scout groups worldwide including Canada, England, Scoutland, Netherlands, So. Africa, W. Germany, and France. The Camporee chiefs and Scout Executive extend to GCARC their hearty and most sincere appreciation for a first class job-well done! They said we were the hit-of-the-Show!

Heading up this event was Tom, N2BPN, who must receive the lions share of the credit for the success of the day. Tom also operated the 20 meter station with many, many contacts for the Scouts to Ragchew. A super job of explanation and introducing the Scouts to Morse Code was turned in by Lou, WB2THM, who was ably assisted by Jim, WB2AOL. After a shakey start (two rigs conked-out) and a valient rescue team effort from George, KB2GW, and Ed, KA2KMW; Doug, WA2NPD, eventually got the 15M station fired-up and many world-wide contacts were made. A gallant effort by N2BPN to erect the highest 2M antenna ever (via Helium-filled balloons) was thwarted by the omnipresence of uncooperative gusts of wind which horizontally planed the balloons toward horizons yon. - 1. Two licensed amateurs, General Class or higher --- not family.
- 2. One official of a recognized club
- 3. Notary Public

Michigan stations must work 15 points, VE and others work 10 points, DX and VHF work 6 points. Charter members 1 through 50 count 2 points, all others count 1 point. One dollar must be submitted to cover mailing cost, etc. Submit applications to MARY MC CARTHY, TASYL #97, 2823 W. First St., Ludington, MI 49431.

2M REPEATER NOISE PROBLEM

By now most of you know that, due to some good detective work by KB2BF and WA2GFK, the noise problem was traced to a faulty clock radio in the home of a resident who lives nearby the repeater. Unfortunately diligent efforts by K2JF to rectify the problem have been hampered by the very uncooperative attitude of the resident and the usual foot-dragging by the FCC. During the week of October 17th, the FCC announced that they would get moving on the problem. Let's hope they are successful in rectifying it soon. Regardless, continuing and increasing pressure will be applied to the FCC until corrective action has been taken.

LEGAL HAPPENINGS, TNX to WESTLINK es K3WIL

- THE VOLUNTEER EXAMINATION PROGRAM for amateur licenses was officially approved September 22nd when the FCC acted on Personal Radio Docket 83-27. Teh biggest surprise was the Commission's decision to establish 13 regional Volunteer Examination Coordinators, rather than selecting a single national V.E.C. The plan calls for designating a V.E.C. in each US call district in addition to 1 each in Alaska, the Pacific islands and the Caribbean. The decision to go with regional V.E.C.'s is widely interpreted as a "wrist slapping" of the ARRL. The League made an ultimatum, late in the consideration of Docket 83-27, to have V.E.C.'s compensated for their efforts or to forgo help from Newington; members of the Commission had felt they had been assured the League would handle the program gratis. Exam administration fees are specifically prohibited by the Report and Order in a section reportedly written by the FCC's legal staff and is based upon the enabling legislation. The ARRL has been lobbying on Capitol Hill for a bill that would legalize the collection of fees. It was assumed that such a bill had no chance for passage due to Senator Goldwater's opposition to it. However, the Senator seems to have changed his mind.
- B. <u>SENATOR GOLDWATER NOW SAYS THAT HE BACKS FEES</u> The ARRL says that US Senator Barry Goldwater, K7UGA, has changed his mind and will back the imposition of fees to offest the expenses of volunteer examiners administering amateur testing.

According to conversations with ARRL Public Information Officer Peter O'Dell, KBlN, and League Counsel Chris Imlay, N3AKD, the League's Washington area Coordinator Perry Williams, WlEUD, met with the Senator on Tuesday, September 27th. At the meeting, K7UGA indicated that he was now in a position to back such enabling legislation and would introduce an amendment to Public Law 97-259 that would permit Volunteer Examination Coordinators to collect a fee of \$4 per exam per applicant, with an excalator clause to cover increased future administrative costs.

Imlay told The Westlink Report that it was his understanding that the Senator would introduce the measure in a very short time, but cautioned that until he took the action, there was no way to be absolutely sure it would occur.

No reason was given for Senator Goldwater's apparent change of mind on the issue, nor was he able to be reached by telephone for commet. In previous statements on the matter of fees, the Senator had seemed to oppose them. Tnx KBlN, N3AKD.

C. CAN THE "NO CODE LOBBY" KILL THE PROPOSAL? Whether or not the lobbying by amateur radio operators of elected representatives will have any effect on killing No Code depends on whom you speak with at the FCC.

At the staff level they confirm that they have received comments from various legislators in opposition to the license class, but at the higher "Commission" level, the feeling is that the Commissioners, themselves, are aware that much of it is generated by emotional reaction within the amateur community.

At the outset, the FCC admitted that they were aware that No Code was an emotional issue, with the distinct "hint" that emotionally generated responses from any source would be largely ignored.

D. <u>CANADIAN GOVERNMENT SEIZES</u> <u>BOOTLEG RADIO GEAR</u> The Canadian Department of Communications has cracked down against a ring of illegal radio operators by seizing equipment and dismantling antennas in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia.

The group against whom the DOC acted is believed to be the notorious "Radio Raiders" which claims a combined membership in excess of half a million world wide.

On the air $10\frac{1}{2}$ meter conversations monitored by Westlink indicate that this is, in fact, the group named in the DOC action, and are illegals who operate both in and out of the ham bands using modified amateur equipment, assign "call-signs" to themselves and even issuing their own QSL cards.

The Canadian enforcement action was taken in cooperation with similar activities in other countries, and prosecutions are likely to follow.
