After centuries of questions about the possibility of life on Mars, one of two spacecraft designed to provide some answers on that subject landed on the surface of the Red Planet fifteen years ago this month. Viking Lander 2 settled to the surface of Utiopia Planitia on September 3, 1976, about six weeks after Viking Lander 1 touched down on the western slope of Chryse Planitia.

The Viking project was the culmination of the first phase of the United States' Mars exploration effort. During the 1960s and early 70s three Mariner spacecraft snapped photographs as they zipped past Mars; a fourth mapped the planet's surface in detail during a year in orbit.

Viking, however, greatly expanded on the accomplishments of the Mariner probes. The Viking project consisted of a flotilla of ships — two landers and two orbiters. While the orbiters photographed the entire planet, the landers measured weather conditions, listened for Mars-quakes, and obtained the first photographs from the Martian surface.

One of the primary Viking objectives was to search for life. Each lander carried biology experiments to scan the soil for microscopic life and search for evidence of metabolic processes similar to those of earthly organisms. The experiments did, in fact, produce results that could be interpreted as signs of life. But scientists later determined that the findings were caused by unusual properties of the Martian soil, not biological processes.

Nevertheless, Viking was a rousing success. The orbiters beamed more than 51,000 photographs to Earth and the landers added 4,500 more. All four spacecraft performed long past their planned operating lifetimes, with Viking Lander 1 continuing to transmit vital data until November 1982. It may be of interest to realize that some of the instruments aboard the various craft were designed, engineered, and built in the RCA Camden plant, as well as having the total instrument package tested in the Space Testing Lab in RCA's Hightstown facility...Tnx K2JF>

Albania Preps for HAM Radio

The following is from the ARRL Letter (vol 10 no 17) dated Aug 24, 1991.

Amateur Radio will officially return to Albania beginning next month, when an international group of amateurs, as guests of the Albanian Department of Posts and Telecommunications (PTT), begin a month-long period of teaching and demonstration operating under the sponsorship of the International Amateur Radio Union.

The announcement of this exciting news for amateurs everywhere was made in Tokyo on Aug. 24 by Mr. Agim Muco, secretary general of the Albanian PTT. Mucho at the same time announced the establishment of the Albanian Amateur Radio Transmitters Society.

It is expected that during the four week project beginning in early September several groups of amateurs will rotate in and out of Tirana, the capital city. The first week of the visit will be devoted to an introduction to Amateur Radio for Albanian officials and interested persons, and will include an opening ceremony tentatively set for Sept. 14 and 15. On-the-air operating is expected to begin after that weekend.

A number of international representatives have been invited to the opening ceremonies.

Joining the IARU in this project are the ARRL, the ARI (Italy), the JARL (Japan), and the Northern California DX Foundation.

Martti Laine, OH2BH, and Pekka Kolehmainen, OH1RY, both board members of SRAL, the Finnish amateur society, will lead the visit, and both will be in Tirana the entire month through early October.

Also expected to participate in the initial week are Seppo Sisatto, OIIIVR, immediate past president of SRAL, and Vilho Plink, OII2BAZ. In subsequent weeks, three teams of three amateurs each are likely to join Laine and Kolehmainen to continue instruction in Amateur Radio and in operating. They are: an International Amateur Radio Union team (led by IARU President Richard L. Baldwin, WIRU); a Japanese team (led by Kan Mizoguchi, JAIBK); and an Italian team (led by Mario Ambrosi, 12MQP, secretary general of ARI, the Italian national society).

The project organizers have suggested authorization to setup HF stations for both SSB and CW operation on the 20-15- and 10-meter bands, with an authorized power of 500 watts.

No call sign(s) for the operation has yet been announced.

Yaesu Musen USA has donated two FT-1000 and two FT-747GX transceivers, to remain in Albania.

Round-the-clock operation was requested "considering the radio propagation to other parts of the world."

The planning and execution of the project, it was decided, would be in cooperation with the IARU "and any of its member associations that may be selected on a later date."

At that point, Laine and others began fine-tuning their official proposal, finishing on Aug.1.

Its "Mission Statement" is as follows:

* To train five to ten Albanian people to become Amateur Radio operators and future instructors for the purpose of promoting Amateur Radio in Albania.

To provide Amateur Radio contacts from Albania to Amateur Radio operators world-wide, and to establish Albania as part of the international Amateur Radio community.

- To establish an Albanian Amateur Radio association to manage and guide Amateur Radio activities in Albania.
- To consult the Albanian PTT in the International Radio Regulations that pertain to Amateur Radio and to demonstrate how those International Radio Regulations can be converted to domestic regulations.

Amateurs around the world now prepare to welcome Albania into the worldwide community of Amateur Radio.
